NOTICE. To Hotel Keepers and all others who deal in Liquors, and for the information of all persons concerned the following sections of Article XXXIII of the Code of Public General Laws of the State of Maryland are published:

Section 105. It shall be unlawful for the keeper of any hotel, tavern, store, drinking establishment or any other place where liquors are sold or for any person or persons, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spirituous or fermented liquors, ale, beer or intoxicating drinks of any kind on the day of any election hereafter to be held in the several counties of this State; any person violating the provisions of this section shall be liable to indictment, and shall upon conviction be fined not less than fifty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars for each offense—one-half the fine shall be paid to the informer, the other half to the county commissioners for the use of the public roads.

Section 106. Any person who shall make any bet or wager upon the result of any election to take place in this State shall be liable to indictment, and, upon conviction thereof, shall be fined not less than fifty nor more than five hundred dollars, to be paid to the State for use of the school fund. Every deposit of money in any part of the State as a wager or bet upon the result of any election in this State or elsewhere shall be forfeited and paid over to the county commissioners of the county where deposited for the use of the county, and if deposited in the city of Baltimore, to the Mayor and City Council.

Section 107. Whoever, during the hours of registration or revision of registration, or during the hours of election or canvass of votes, or of making returns thereof in any precinct, shall bring, take, order or send into any place of registration, or revision of registration, or of election, any distilled or spirituous liquors, wine, ale or beer, or shall at any such time and place drink or partake of such liquor, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof, be fined not less than ten dollars (\$10), nor more than one hundred dollars.
