The Republican plurality in Maryland is 32,237.

Mudd's plurality in the 5th Congressional district is 3,507.

In Maryland the Democracy was overwhelmingly beaten. The majority is way up yonder.

Tuesday's election showed the power of money. The Presidency was struck off to the highest bidder.

The vote in Maryland was for McKinley, 119,758; Bryan, 87,521; Levering, 4,343; Palmer, 2,018.

Virginia gives a good Democratic majority and elects eight Democratic Congressmen and two Republicans.

The United States belongs to the Trusts, Syndicates, Combinations, &c., and Marc Hanna is boss of the aggregation.

I would rather be a defeated Democrat than a triumphant Republican. It is about all the satisfaction I can get out of the result.

How much gold will get into circulation now. The stability of the currency is now assured, but it will be stable in the millionaire's strong box.

A strike of oyster shuckers took place at Crisfield.

Mrs. Anne E. Garey's house in Caroline county, burned.

A Farmers' Institute has been organized in Wicomico county.

The barn of Archibald Heaps, at South Delta, Harford county, was burned.

Health officers visited St. Michael's and found twenty cases of diphtheria.

At Sandy Hook, in Washington county, a school boy was killed by a falling tree.

At Snow Hill Justice Peter Beauchamp was acquitted of the charge of train-wrecking.

Lewis Crockett, of Tangier Island was fined for measuring oysters in a flour barrel.

At Cumberland the Baltimore and Ohio Company is working day and night on the new shifting-yards.

The historic Chase mansion at Annapolis will soon be converted into a home for infirm and destitute women.

In Talbot county a raid has been made on violators of the local-option law and they will be tried in the United States Court.

Dr. H. Newell Martin, professor of biology at the Johns Hopkins University from 1876 to 1893, died in Burley, England, last Thursday.

The State's attorney for Allegany county dismissed ten cases against saloon-keepers indicted for selling liquor to habitual drunkards.

Mr. Otho Holland Williams, Jr., was killed by a pistol held in his own hands at his country home, "The Hermitage," in Queen Anne's county.

Rosa Scribner, colored, 9 North Carlton street, Baltimore, died from the effects of a wound near her heart. Peter Scribner her husband, was arrested charged with her murder.

In Cumberland two men were convicted of illegally entering a house and carrying away furniture which had been bought on the installment plan and upon which default in payment had been made.

GOLD WINS.

A Republican Sweep.

SILVER NOT IN IT.

Major William McKinley, of Canton, is President elect. His majority in the Electoral College will be over 131, and on the popular vote something enormous.

The Republicans swept Maryland by a majority of at least 27,000.

The election in Baltimore resulted in a Republican sweep. In the twenty-two wards, sixteen Republican Councilmen were chosen—a genuine Democratic Waterloo. Mr. Stockbridge was elected judge over Mr. Robertson. The two ordinances, one providing for a funding loan of \$1,600,000, and the other for \$1,000,000 for conduits, were ratified. The city gave a Republican majority of some 15,000.

It is only a question of Republican majorities in Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, Minnesota, Michigan, New England, New Jersey, Maryland and West Virginia.

The Australian ballot delayed the count in the far West and but meagre returns had been received when we went to press, but the indications are that the more popular states in that section also voted for McKinley.

The Republicans will have the House of Representatives by a large majority. The entire delegation from Maryland will be Republican.
