## Treaty Ratified.

February 6th, the U. S. Senate by a vote of 57 to 27 ratified the Treaty of Paris. The yeas were made up of 39 Republicans and 16 Democrats and 2 Populists. The nays were 22 Democrats, 3 Republicans and 3 Populists.

The Baltimore Sun of Tuesday says: "Those courageous Senators who opposed ratification of the treaty without modification, despite the hysterical denunciation of the imperialist press, are entitled to the gratitude of all who have the welfare of their country at heart." Mr. Gorman led the opposition.

## Battle of Manila.

Saturday and Sunday there was a battle between the American troops under Gen. Otis and the Filipinos. The scene of the fight was a semi circle of fully seven miles before the city of Manila. By 10 a. m. Sunday the Americans had completely routed the enemy and driven them at least ten miles. The American loss was 34 killed and 63 wounded. The loss of the Filipinos is estimated at 2,000 killed, 3,500 wounded and 5,000 prisoners.

## Washington Letter.

Senator Gorman has accomplished the principal object for which he fought the ratification of the treaty. The speeches made in the Senate have aroused the people of the country to the danger that lies in our permanent possession of the Philippines and aroused public opinion to the danger of carrying out of the imperial policy that has been buzzing in the heads of Mr. McKinley and some of his chief advisers. Mr. Gorman thinks that public opinion could not have been so speedily or so thoroughly aroused in any other way, as it has been by the fight he and those who acted with him, have made. They were not strong enough in votes to amend the treaty, but the result shows that there are more ways than hanging to kill a dog. If Imperialism hasn't been killed, it has been badly crippled.

Mr. Keegan, a representative of the International Mechanics Union who was among those heard by the Senate Committee on Education and Labor, on the eight hour bill, made some startling charges. He charged that the Cramp Shipbuilding Company and the Maxim-Nordenfeldt Gun Company, being unable to fill at the price specified in contracts for guns and gun carriages, awarded them by the Government, had had the work performed by Government employees at the Washington Navy Yard, and received in cash, the difference between the cost of making and the contract price. He charged that under the arrangement specified, the Cramp Company had received \$17,000, as the difference between the cost of making the gun carriage and the contract price, and that the Maxim-Nordenfeldt Co. had received \$2400 each for guns which were made by government employees, at a cost of \$1,000 each, thus pocketing a profit of \$1400 on each gun, without engaging in the work of making them. Senator Kyle was directed to personally investigate these charges.

The House Judiciary Committee has reported a resolution declaring that Gen. Wheeler, Col. Campbell, Col. Colson, and Major Robbins vacated their seats in the House when they accepted Commissions in the Army. The attempt to have the committee take the same action in cases of Representatives who are members of several existing Government Commissions, was a failure. The Committee decided that Congressmen may serve on Civil Commissions without forfeiting their seats.

Although the Republican House Caucuses decided not to try to push any financial legislation at this session, the extreme good standard men are trying to force action on the Hill financial bill. A resolution has been offered, fixing Feb. 14, for voting on that bill, and pressure is being brought to bear on the Committee on Rules, to have that resolution reported back to the House.
