Monday, May 1, 1899, Secretary Hay placed in the hands of M. Cambon, French ambassador at Washington as agent of the Spanish government, warrants for the payment of \$20,000,000, the sum agreed upon as compensation to Spain for the relinquishment of her sovereignty over the Philippine archipelago. We have bought and paid for our rabbit and will cook him when we catch him.

Our Republican contemporaries have explained Malster's defeat by Hayes for Mayor of Baltimore. The Towson Union lays it to "too much Malster," the Baltimore American believes Gorman is responsible for it, and other doctors assign yet different reasons. Uncle Phil Dorse says that the true explanation is, "that Hayes got so many votes that it was impossible to figure out Malster's election."

The Beef Investigating Board has returned the Scotch verdict of "not proven." It finds that Gen. Miles' allegations regarding refrigerated beef are not sustained and that the canned beef was good when delivered. The report criticizes Gen. Miles for his failure to notify the Secretary of War of his belief that the beef was unfit and caused sickness. Gen. Egan is sharply criticized for buying such large quantities of canned beef. The Board recommends that no further proceedings be taken, believing, we suppose, that the more the matter is stirred the more odiferous it will be.

Before he was elected Senator from Prince George's county by the Democrats, Hon. Wm. M. Claggett had been a Tobacco Inspector, and to his experience in the warehouses is in great measure due the many good points of the present law. The first year under the new Act has just passed, and the report of Mr. William Frank Ford, chief inspector, shows that, after the payment of the cost of operation, there has been turned into the State Treasury the sum of \$15,705. The showing is a good one and the chief inspector says that it would have been much better but for the competition of the private warehouse.

The report contains the following summary of balances earned:

It has been decided by the Russian Government to reform the calendar and adopt the method of reckoning now in vogue throughout Christendom. The "old style" will be superseded by the new on June 1, next, and in order to bring themselves up to date the Russians will have to drop twelve days out of the current month. Russia's tardiness in accepting the reformed calendar is more apparent than real; for considering her late entrance into the community of civilized nations she has been constrained by her orthodox prejudices to hold fast to the error of the Julian calendar during a shorter period of her existence as a civilized power than was enlightened England. The reformation of the calendar was proposed by Pope Gregory in 1582, but Protestant Britain refused to adopt the new reckoning until 1752, and George Washington was born on February 11 according to the "old style," which was in vogue in the British colonies until nineteen years after the date of his birth.—Philadelphia Record.

WASHINGTON LETTER.
(From Our Regular Correspondent.)
Washington, May 8th, 1899.
Boss Platt's edict has gone forth that New York shall have but one candidate for the Speakership, and that Payne, Ray and possibly other members of the delegation, who have either positively or partially announced themselves as candidates will be forced out of the way to give Sherman the unanimous support of the delegation. This, and rumors that Sherman had made a deal with Hanna caused quite a marked boom in Sherman stock, and Sherman is now in favor in sporting circles.

Treasury officials have refused to allow an item headed "travelling

expenses" in the personal accounts of Roger C. Spooner, Special Indian Agent "temporarily" in charge of the Indian warehouse in Chicago, because the aforesaid traveling expenses were incurred by Spooner in going between his home in Wisconsin and his office in Chicago, and are not considered to have been necessary to the proper performance of his public duties. Spooner is a brother of Senator Spooner and holds his position by a trick. The position of Superintendent of the Indian Warehouse is supposed to be under Civil Service Rules; also to be vacant. Nearly a year ago, Senator Spooner carried an order to Secretary Bliss from Mr. McKinley, telling him to provide a good place for his brother. It was done by appointing him as special Indian Agent and putting him in temporary charge of the warehouse in Chicago, where he has been ever since, filling a position that is in the classified service, without ever having even taken an examination. Still, there are some otherwise level-headed men who will get "nutty" when the Civil Service Rules are spoken of as the "humbug they really are."

Mr. McKinley seems to be developing a disposition to play Czar. He ordered Representative Henderson, of Iowa, Chairman of the Republican Caucus Committee that recently completed a financial bill, to change it before it was submitted to the republicans in the Senate Finance Committee, who it seems must approve it before it is made public. Col. Henderson is a peppery sort of a fellow occasionally, but being a candidate for Speaker of the House, he did not care to quarrel with Mr. McKinley, so he only called his attention to the fact that every clause in the bill had been put there by the unanimous vote of the committee. The order to change it was reiterated by Mr. McKinley.

It has been decided by the republican leaders that an extra session of Congress shall be called, probably early in the fall, but in order to give themselves an opportunity to change their minds, should it be deemed advisable later to do so, they will not say more than that an extra session is probable. The fact of the matter is that they are getting uneasy over the political outlook. A short time ago they were figuring on a walk-over for McKinley next year, but now they are frightened. One of them said: "Mr. McKinley will, of course, be a candidate for renomination, but it is by no means certain that he will win. The scandals under his administration have made it difficult for his friends to defend it. Alger, Shafter, Egan and others who have figured prominently in the administration, have not added to Mr. McKinley's reputation or improved his chances for renomination. Conservative observers believe that Algerism and Eganism will prove a heavier load than Mr. McKinley can carry, and that even if renominated he would be defeated. The Philippine situation continues to be a combination of dickering and fighting, although the administration claims that the submission of Aguinaldo is now fully assured, but they do not say when. His subjugation has been a sure thing from the first, but it has already cost more, both in money and blood than it will ever be worth to the people of this country."
