course, I feel kindly toward him and his brother. On this account, I take the liberty of addressing you in their behalf. If you can see your way clear, under all the circumstances, to grant them executive clemency, it would oblige "S. B. ELKINS."

This is only a sample of the many letters from men of national reputation throughout Missouri and the United States who appealed to the Governor and the Pardon Board of Minnesota, urging that justice had been satisfied after twenty-five years of penal servitude and that it were time that mercy should sit upon the throne.

### Bronaugh's Active Work for the Prisoners.

It is no small task to gather petitions from three successive Missouri Legislatures, and the officials of several Missouri State Cabinets, from prominent members of the Grand Army of the Republic in behalf of these men, but Capt. Bronaugh set his shoulder to the wheel with the determination that knew no defeat, with a vigor unabated by twenty-five years of unsuccess, until finally the sentiment in Minnesota was completely reversed, and on noon of Sunday, July 14, the stalwart Henry County Missourian walked forth from Stillwater Penitentiary with Cole Younger on his right arm and Jim on his left.

### Case a Factor in Minnesota Politics.

No case in the criminology of the world has attracted, perhaps, so much attention as that of the Youngers. It has entered into the politics of Minnesota in several campaigns and been a burning, though not an avowed, issue. Before the Pardon Board took favorable action the release of the prisoners was recommended by two successive legislatures.

Governor Marshall of Minnesota, a former Missourian, ardently espoused the cause of the Youngers, and after his term in office took an active and intense interest in the efforts to secure their liberty. Warden Wolfer, won to the cause of the prisoners by their own mien and demeanor, became one of their staunchest supporters. Like his predecessors he gave them many privileges, one of which they coveted very much—the right to wear a Confederate-gray uniform.

### Cole Younger's Little Love Affair.

It is not generally known that during his quarter of a century's imprisonment Cole Younger was the center of a love romance, whose fruition was only prevented by the Prison Board. Miss Lillian Lewis, well-known as an actress, was the center of his affection, and had made many visits to jail to the prisoner to see him, and had his release come sooner than a year ago, when Miss Lewis died, it is asserted by his warmest friends that a few days after the parole would have heard the wedding bells.

The Pardon Board for the State of Minnesota, which finally consented to a parole, consists of Gov. V. M. Clough, Chief Justice Chas. M. Start, Attorney General H. W. Childs.

So kind have the prison officials been to the Younger brothers that they might have appropriately repeated from Lord Byron's "Prisoners of Chillon" on the occasion of their release:

And when men came to set me free,  
I reeked not when, I cared not where—  
Alas, it was the same to me,  
Fettered or fetterless to be:  
I learned to love despair,  
With spiders I had friendship made,  
Had watched them in their sullen trade,  
Had seen the mice by moonlight play,  
And why should I feel less than they?  
And if the monarch of each race had power to kill,  
Yet strange to tell in quiet we had learned to dwell,
