Grand Jury Report.

To the Honorable Judges of the Circuit Court for St. Mary's County. We the Grand Jurors of the State of Maryland for the body of St. Mary's County sitting during the September Term of this Court, A. D., 1903, beg leave to submit the following report:

We have carefully inquired into all infractions of the law, brought to our notice and have rendered presentments in all cases where the evidence was sufficient to justify the same.

We renew the recommendation of the last Grand Jury that in all trivial cases in which magistrates have jurisdiction, that the same be disposed of by said magistrates.

We find that sections of the public roads in some parts of the county are in very bad condition and we attribute these conditions to the fact that some of the supervisors have not respected the law, which requires them to go over all roads entrusted to their care twice each year.

On the contrary they have under the direction of the inspectors, expended an undue amount of labor and money on parts of the roads to the entire neglect of other parts which they knew to be nearly impassable. This we find, from reports made to us by responsible parties, to be notably the case in the sixth district, where a section of very bad road nearly half mile long and leading to one of the public wharves has not been touched in the two years that the present law has been in operation and has now become dangerous and must become impassable when the winter sets in.

In view of conditions stated above, we believe the present law does not measure up to the requirements of a good road law and has not realized the expectations of the framers thereof. We therefore recommend its repeal and the enactment of a law embracing the following provisions:

Three Road Commissioners to be appointed in each election district. That said commissioners shall have entire control of all moneys expended and work done in their districts on roads.

That all moneys collected for repairs of roads shall be apportioned in the several districts according to basis of taxation.

That each road commissioner shall be a taxpayer on property assessed at not less than two thousand dollars.

That no person shall be eligible for appointment to the position of road commissioner who is a candidate for a political office and that no person shall be road commissioner who holds a political office.

That road commissioners shall be appointed by county commissioners.

That every citizen of St. Mary's county who owns and uses a wheeled vehicle or vehicles shall pay a tax of one dollar to be expended on the roads in his district.

In reference to the oyster question touched on by the Court in his charge to the Grand Jury, we will say we approve the suggestion of the Court, and recommend that the working season be shortened by taking off a part or all of the months of September and April, to the end that the oyster may have more time to grow and so improve the quality and increase the quantity of the output of the oyster beds of our State.

Of course we recommend no change in the law as to the Potomac River that would deprive a citizen of Maryland of any privilege enjoyed by a citizen of Virginia—any legislation for the Potomac must be joint work of the two States.

We wish to call the attention of the Court and the public to the "pay parties" which have come in vogue with a certain class of our people. These "pay parties" are given by private persons for personal profit.

Whiskey and other spirituous drinks are sold on such occasions either by the party giving the entertainment or others, who carry it there and the consequence is that disorderly conduct and frequently serious riots occur and trials by magistrates and the Circuit Courts are the usual sequel—demoralization of the community and increased taxation are the necessary consequence. We recommend that "pay parties" for private, and personal profit, be suppressed by act of the next General Assembly if there be no other remedy.

We have inspected the jail and find one of the cells in need of repairs, the sanitary condition bad and the stoves entirely inadequate to the needs of the building; and recommend that these defects be remedied.

We have examined the list of traders licenses and find the same correct.

We have made such an examination of the accounts of the county as is possible under the conditions and in the time at our disposal and find them correct; but we call attention to the fact that the financial condition of the county, with especial reference to its debts, sinking funds and etc., is not shown in the annual published statements and we recommend that in future this be done.
