Car Advertising And Its Modern Growth.

With Something About Mr. J. E. M. Raley, Its Chief Exponent Here.

In no country in the world is the spirit of progressiveness so much alive as in the United States, and nowhere it can be truthfully said, are the opportunities for individual advancement greater than they are here. Every day new stars are discovered in the financial and industrial firmaments, and their names are heralded broadcast throughout the length and breadth of the land, and in the columns of the press are read with avidity by the greatest of all newspaper-reading nations.

In a day men spring from obscurity into the limelight of publicity, but unless their names are kept continually before the public gaze their descent into obscurity is just as meteoric as was their rise. Not only of men can this be said, but it is the rule in every line of business and in every walk of life. To be successful one must "keep at it." Nothing is so despicable in the eyes of the American people as a "quitter." The man who hands favor in their eyes is the man who does things, and when you have the people with you the road to success is as easy as rowing a boat down stream.

But how can a man get the people with him? you ask.

The answer is simple: Keep your name or the name of your firm always before them; let not a moment pass by without telling the people that you have something that will interest them and by keeping at it you will soon make the public believe you, and the results will show for themselves.

To do this you must advertise, and do it in such a manner that the public will read what you say. One of the best mediums, outside of the great city dailies, for reaching the public, is the street car advertisement. Its efficacy has been tried on numerous occasions and has not been found wanting. In Baltimore, as in 341 other cities of this country, this service is controlled exclusively by one man, and a young man at that. He is Mr. Barron G. Collier, who was recently elected secretary of the International Advertising Association, at the St. Louis Fair, and who is acknowledged as the highest authority on street-car publicity in this country.

By hard work Mr. Collier has built up his business from a small beginning until it is now recognized as one of the greatest advertising concerns in the United States. He has branch offices in nearly every city and town of any importance in the South and West, with headquarters in New York, where he maintains one of the most complete offices and art departments in the country. In Baltimore Mr. Collier is represented by Mr. J. E. M. Raley, with offices in the Fidelity Building, corner Charles and Lexington streets. Mr. Raley has represented Mr. Collier's interests in Washington, D. C., Norfolk and the adjacent group of Virginia cities, and for the past two years he has had the management of all the towns in Texas, Louisiana, Mississippi, Florida and Arkansas, with headquarters at New Orleans, where he did an enormous business.

He has only recently assumed the management of Mr. Collier's Baltimore interests (including the town of Frederick, Hagerstown and Cumberland) and has already increased some of the largest local business houses in street-car advertising. The Herald is now using space on the street-car dashboards.

Mr. Raley is a native Marylander, having been born in St. Mary's county, but has spent most of his short business career in New York city and the West.—Baltimore Herald.

Tribute to The Late John Armistead Scott.

Mr. B. Harris Camaller in the course of his address of welcome to the late Teachers' Institute, held in the Town Hall here, paid the following tribute to our deceased friend, John A. Scott, who had been a conscientious teacher in the public schools of this State for more than thirty-five years. Mr. Camaller said:

"Amid these pleasant scenes, this happy greeting, there comes over one a feeling of sadness and sorrow as I look around this Hall for the pleasant and familiar face of one who hitherto was prompt and punctual

in his attendance upon these institutes, and find that he is not here today. John Armistead Scott. Alas! You know too well that the angel of death has hovered over your useful and honored association since last year assembled here, and has called him away from these scenes of his usefulness forever. I knew him well and esteemed him much and would be false to the promptings of my heart if I did not lay one simple laurel leaf upon his memory on this occasion. I feel that it is eminently fitting here, because his whole life was devoted to the holy and noble cause of teaching in the public schools of this country and elsewhere in the State, and he has gone down to his grave, honored, loved and admired by all, and with the universal plaudits that a more conscientious and painstaking teacher never sat beneath the humble roof of a country school house. It was in my early boyhood before my mind had lost one leaf from that romance which characterizes youth, that I felt the influence of his teaching, and in all the years of my life since then, I have been in close and congenial touch with him. Truly then can I claim that I knew him well, and knowing him, can truthfully and sincerely say, that no grander and nobler mortal ever put on the crown of immortality. The whispered teachings of our faith, "Whom I love, I call," impress me in his death with the force and beauty of the lines of a favorite poet that "Beyond this vale of tears, There is a life above, Unmeasured by the flight of years, And all that life, is love."

There is however, in his death a melancholy consolation to us all, and especially to you, my teacher-friends, in the fact, that before he passed away his noble heart was made glad by the enactment of that just and meritorious law which has given unmistakable evidence of the deep gratitude of the people of our State, to their faithful teachers' work in the public schools, whose life like his, has been devoted to your high and noble profession.
