Samuel E. Tubman and Miss Ethel M. Beavans, both of the Bay district, this county, were married in Baltimore, Friday last.

A white horse belonging to James Gordon, colored, of Leonardtown, died last Monday. The animal had no infectious or contagious disease.

The ice on Britton's Bay is very much thicker than it has been for years. The snow and sleet falling on it has greatly increased its thickness.

The ice in the Chesapeake Bay is causing more delay to shipping than has been experienced for many years. The ice in Baltimore harbor is 9 inches thick.

The School Board's session last Tuesday auditing reports for the quarter ended January 31st, ultimo, and checks will be sent out this week. Order was passed closing the colored schools March 1st, proximo.

Died on the 27th, ultimo after a short illness of pneumonia, Maria Cutch, colored, wife of Joseph Cutch, in the 66th year of her age. She was an industrious and reliable colored woman, and leaves many friends both white and colored to regret her death. May she rest in peace!

Last week, while Charles Butler, colored, was driving a wagon up "Hanover" hill the horses stopped and backed the wagon down the deep gully near the top of the hill. The horses were saved, but the wagon was demolished. The team belonged to Mr. Joseph T. Gough, of "Solitude."

A wrecking engine and crew came down to New Market and replaced the engine of the W. & P. R. R., on the track last Tuesday and traffic was resumed over the road. Trains are now running as usual.

Associate Judge Crane has filed his opinion in the case of Somerville vs. James E. Coppage. The judgment is in favor of Coppage. Action was to compel performance of an alleged contract, by correspondence, to purchase Somerville's farm. Case was argued summarily by Messrs. John B. Gray, W. J. Mattingly and Robert C. Combs, Jos. F. Morgan and B. Harris Camalier for defendant. The principal ground of the decision was the insufficient identification in the correspondence of the farm negotiated.

During the past week several dredgers have passed through Leonardtown, en route to the railroad station at Mechanicsville. They report that their vessel, the E. King, of Baltimore, belonging to James Standon, Captain James Patience, was cut through near Ragged Point and brought to Piney Point and there anchored. The captain and his son and two other men remained with the vessel, and James Gwynn, Frank Fisher, Chris. Malander, Paul Oates and John Hobel tramped to the station. The vessel had about 400 hundred bushels of oysters on board.
