Election, Tuesday, November 7, 1905.

On our first page we reprint Chairman Vandiver's explanation of the proposed Amendment to our State Constitution, and on our fourth page we print the Governor's proclamation of the Amendment that is to be voted upon. Read the Proclamation and then read Mr. Vandiver's explanation to see for yourselves whether he has correctly stated the scope and the meaning of the proposed amendment.

There are some who favored the Constitutional Amendment proposed by State Senator Gill, of Baltimore City, and who claim that the Amendment to be voted upon is too drastic. We wonder if many of these have read and considered the Gill Amendment. It may be found on pages 475-6 of the Senate Journal of the Session of 1904. The Gill Amendment required voters "to be able to read and write correctly, on dictation, any section of the Constitution of Maryland, or have paid for the two preceding years State and County or City taxes amounting to at least one hundred (\$100) dollars for each year, provided that any person who was entitled to vote in one of the States of the United States on January 1, 1868, or any time prior thereto, or until the year 1916, any person who is a lineal descendant of some person who was entitled to vote in one of the States on January 1, 1868, or some time prior thereto, shall be entitled to vote whether he possesses the above described property or educational qualifications or not. No property or educational qualification shall be required of persons entitled to vote in one of the States of the United States prior to January 1, 1868, or before the year 1916 of any lineal descendant of such persons."

Attorney General Bryan is opposed to the amendment to be voted upon next November. Did he favor the Gill amendment which Democratic representatives refused to pass? Had they passed the Gill amendment and it was adopted by the people, after 1916 if a man could not read and write or had not paid \$100 taxes for two years preceding his registration he would not have been allowed to vote. Compare this with the Amendment the General Assembly did actually pass and see which of the two is more drastic, remembering at the same time that one of the principal arguments against the amendment that is to be voted on by the people, is the fact that a Board of Registration is named as the judges of the qualifications of the applicants for registration and that in the Gill amendment the educational test is more severe and the judges of the qualifications of applicants for registration are simply not named, though they must have been the officers of registration. But why pursue this phase of the subject further. Every one of our readers may read and see for himself.

The "Liberty of Fishing."

We subjoin a translation of Article XVI of the Charter of Maryland, and invite its perusal. The people of the State claim, and we hope, will ever maintain their "liberty of fishing."

XVI. And furthermore, of our ample special grace, and of our certain knowledge, and mere motion, We do, for us, our heirs and successors, grant unto the aforesaid now baron of BALTIMORE, his heirs and assigns, full and absolute power and authority to make, erect, and constitute, within the province of MARYLAND, and the islands and islets aforesaid, such, and so many sea ports, harbours, creeks, and other places of unloading and discharge of goods and merchandizes out of ships, boats, and other vessels, and of lading in the same, and in so many, and such places, and with such rights, jurisdictions, liberties, and privileges, unto such ports respecting, as to him or them shall seem most expedient. And, that all and every the ships, boats and other vessels whatsoever, coming to, or going from the province aforesaid, for the sake of merchandizing, shall be laden and unladen at such ports only as

shall be so erected and constituted by the said now baron of BALTIMORE, his heirs and assigns, any usage, custom, or any other thing whatsoever to the contrary notwithstanding. Saving always to us, our heirs and successors, and to all the subjects of our kingdoms of England and Ireland, of us, our heirs and successors, the liberty of fishing for sea-fish, as well in the seas, bays, straits and navigable rivers, as in the harbours, bays and creeks of the province aforesaid; and the privilege of salting and drying fish on the shores of the same province; and for that cause, to cut down and take hedging-wood and twigs there growing, and to build huts and cabins, necessary in this behalf, in the same manner as heretofore they reasonably might, or have used to do. Which liberties and privileges, the said subjects of us, our heirs and successors, shall enjoy without notable damage or injury in any wise to be done to the aforesaid now baron of Baltimore, his heirs or assigns, or to the residents and inhabitants of the same province in the ports, creeks, and shores aforesaid, and especially in the woods and trees there growing. And if any person shall do damage or injury of this kind, he shall incur the peril and pain of the heavy displeasure of us, our heirs and successors, and of the due chastisement of the laws, besides making satisfaction.

News Notes.

Mr. Daniel Keane, the oldest man in Cumberland died aged 101 years. Three men were killed in a Tennessee and one in a Kentucky feud. The Sultan of Sulu offered his hand in marriage to Miss Alice Roosevelt. Delaware Union Republicans are reported to have dropped J. Edward Addicks. Nine persons were killed at Butte, Mont., in a trolley car which was struck by a freight train. The trip of the Plunger, the submarine boat, to Oyster Bay, in order that the President may see her in operation, is regarded as involving much mystery.

Within a few weeks the fight for the suffrage amendment will be on, and the Democratic State leaders plan to make it one of the hottest in the history of the State. The caterer of the Tombs Prison intends to sue Nan Patterson because of her alleged failure to return a rabbit's foot which has brought freedom to various noted prisoners. Mr. David E. Dick, Republican candidate in Allegany for the State Senate, announced at Lonaconing that when Colonel Pearce retired from Congress he wanted to fill the position. Mr. T. B. Taylor, of Elliott City, advertised for work without pay, and explained that he was desirous of employment for its own sake, accounting enforced idleness as the greatest of afflictions.
