Election, Tuesday, November 7, 1905.

Miss Jane Morgan has been regularly licensed as a pilot at Annapolis.

The Democratic State Convention will meet in Baltimore Thursday, September 28th. It will nominate a candidate for Comptroller and adopt a platform.

While President McCall of the New York Life and others of his ilk were howling for "honest money" in the Bryan campaign, they were contributing cash filched from widows and orphans to the Republican campaign fund. As the Commoner puts it "in their solicitude for the 'national honor' they forgot their own."

The Democrats of Charles county have nominated for the State Senate Walter J. Mitchell, Editor of the *Times-Creasant*. In naming Mr. Mitchell, they have put up their best man, and in the Senate he will be a credit to his county and the State at large. Walter Mitchell is 34 years old, has practiced law for 10 years and edited the *Times-Creasant* for 8 years. He is a thorough Democrat and an upright, talented man. Hurrah for Mitchell!

Franklin Leonard, Jr., defeated Democratic candidate for Congress in the Sixteenth N. Y. district and holder of a \$20,000 policy in the New York Life wants President McCall to tell him how much of his money and the money of the more than 23,000 Democrats who voted for him was used to accomplish his defeat. Mr. Leonard's district is a close one and he believes that part of the N. Y. Life's \$48,000 contribution to the Republican campaign fund was used to beat him.

With next Monday's Republican County Convention the campaign in St. Mary's county will be formally opened. It is reported that the Steering Committee will recommend that the Republicans do not nominate a full ticket, but that they nominate for certain offices and leave certain other offices to be filled by nominations by certificate. In this manner a fusion ticket is to be named. It is said that the Republicans will nominate for the House of Delegates, and the Sheriff and that the Senate, Treasurer and County Commissioner will be put on the ticket by certificate or petition. Of course, we cannot vouch for the accuracy of this statement. It is the common report and we give it for what it is worth.

"In the dark days that followed the Civil War the Republican party inflamed the black man with a false conception of his own wrongs and sent him forth a moral firebrand.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

There is more individual trouble brewing between the Secretary of the Treasury and Surgeon General of the Marine Hospital Service. Of course it is known that the Marine Hospital Service is a branch of the Treasury Department just as is the Light House Board and the Life Saving Service. But the Marine Hospital Service is a very important branch and has of late years been getting farther and farther away from the Treasury in the matter of independent action. The latest trouble in that direction has called out another investigating committee which has discovered what the Secretary of Treasury knew already, namely that the Surgeon General of the Marine Hospital Service has gone over the Secretary's head and gotten legislation by Congress without the approval of the Treasury Department. It was only in the matter of the merging of the offices of chief clerk and disbursing officer in the service. But it was done without authority, and as the Marine Hospital Service has just had the satisfaction of seeing its voucher clerk arrested for raising vouchers to the amount of about \$20,000 the Secretary of the Treasury thought it was a good time to call down the Surgeon General. And he did. What the outcome of the fight will be no one knows.

The Secretary of War will find his hands full when he returns to Washington. He will undoubtedly be called upon to make an investigation of Panama affairs, for the country has been flooded of late with reports of the bad conditions on the isthmus and the way the work is not getting done on the canal. He will have to organize a campaign for Philippine free trade, there will be a report to the President on the Chinese boycott, action will be necessary in the Taggart case, which has stirred up the army from end to end. And above all there will be the question of reestablishing the post canteen in army garrisons. This is a subject that it will take a lot of moral stamina to handle, and it is possible that the Secretary will elect to let it drop. But army officers as a rule say it ought to be done.
