"You can't lose me Charlie," as the Hon. Mudd remarked to the Hon. Bonaparte at the recent meeting of the Republican State Central Committee.

At the meeting of the Republican State Central Committee held in Baltimore, Wednesday, April 4th, instant, Mr. Thomas Parran, of Calvert County, was elected Chairman vice Mr. John B. Hanna. Congressman Mudd chaperoned the meeting.

The Honorable Sydney E. Mudd stacked the cards on the Honorable Charles J. Bonaparte at the recent meeting of the Republican State Central Committee, caught Charlie's Jack and played high, low, Jack, gift and game on him. If Br'er Bonaparte continues to sit in with Br'er Sydney he will in time learn several new points of the game.

The Baltimore City Democrats have just emerged from a strenuous primary and the manner in which they are coming together for the municipal election is encouraging and inspiring. The defeated candidates for the Mayoralty nomination—Messrs. Brown and Lintihim—are earnestly at work for their successful competitor, and their lieutenants in the primary fight are now doing yeoman work for Mahool's election. Allover the State the Democrats are enthused by such action for it presages victory for the party.

County Democrats should follow the good example set them by their city brethren and "get together." The rank and file of the party is all ways in line, but it sometimes happens that the leaders straggle. The coming campaign is no time for sulking or faltering, but demands bold and aggressive fighting. To compass the defeat of the Republicans, astutely led as they are by Mudd and Parran, will require all the energies of Democrats and they should not waste their strength and substance in factional fights among themselves. Every leader, every element should join readily and loyally in any move tending to harmonious action and to cement the party's battle line. Show your belief in Democratic principles by your work for Democratic success. Don't be jealous of other Democrats; don't bruise old sores and keep alive old animosities, and don't be a "dog in the manger." Look to the future!

## Mr. Bonaparte's Waterloo.

The manner in which congressman Mudd ousted from the State's chairmanship last Wednesday Mr. John B. Hanna and installed in his place his close personal and political friend, Mr. Thomas Parran, came as a shock to the Bonaparte faction in the party. The incident is believed to have been humiliating to the attorney General, and it is said that on the day following his usual serenity and impassiveness were quite disturbed.

But the Attorney-General is helpless. The only friends within the organization whom he has are apparently Collector Stone and Congressman Pearre. The former controlled 26 votes in the State Central Committee and the latter 19. Mr. Hanna had the five from his own county of Harford, but that was all. When they were totaled up the entire Bonaparte strength in the party organization was totaled.

On the other hand, Congressman Mudd had all of Southern Maryland, Congressman Jackson had all of the Eastern Shore, and through Mr. P. L. Goldsborough, the combination managed to secure Carroll county. Then it was also demonstrated that Mr. Bonaparte and his friends could not control his own county—Baltimore—and that Mr. Robert Garrett had no influence with the delegates there. Mr. James E. Ingram was the real man who swung them, and he swung them in line for Parran and with the Mudd-Jackson-Goldsborough combination.

Those who witnessed the way in which Mr. Mudd ran the State committee on Wednesday 10, are confident that he will be in as full charge of the Republican State convention. That means that Mr. Mudd, will draft the platform of the party and practically dictate the nominations for Governor, Attorney-General,

Comptroller and Clerk of the Court of Appeals. At present he is in complete mastery of the Republican situation, and he has accomplished it without having a single vote from Baltimore.

The politicians friendly to the Bonaparte element are certain that Mudd domination of the party spells party defeat, but they are "sore" just now as a result of their recent defeat. The tameness with which Mr. Bonaparte accepted his defeat at the hands of Mr. Mudd surprised his friends, who believed the Attorney-General's civil service and Reform League principles would rise up and revolt at the idea of Mr. Mudd being in control of the party and Mr. Mudd's political lieutenants being at helm of the committee. Instead Mr. Bonaparte meekly said in comment that "Mr. Parran will make most excellent chairman." Those who have talked with the Attorney-General since Mr. Parran was made chairman say that he is not pleased.—Sunday's Sun.

## The Frigate Constitution To Be Exhibited At The Jamestown Exposition.

Norfolk, Va.—A report received from the Charleston Navy Yard, Boston, Mass., states that the famous old sea fighter, the "Constitution", is now undergoing repairs. Consequently a visit to the Jamestown Exposition, to be held on the shores of Hampton Roads. The vessel has been in the Charleston Navy Yard since October 1897, where she was towed from Portsmouth, New Hampshire, and owing to many years neglect, it will be almost midsummer before she will be able to join in the grand naval pageantry, that will be on display during the period of the Jamestown Exposition. Only structural repairs are now being made on the Constitution, but a movement is on foot to collect the many souvenirs and equipment taken from the vessel at various times, so that she will have as near as possible, her original appearance.

The Constitution is 175 feet in length, and 42 feet in width, with a normal load draught of 1970 tons. No ship of ancient or modern type has had such a glorious career as the Constitution.

Such was the uniformity of her success that the British Admiralty ordered that the English frigates should not fight her unless they met her in force. On August 19th, 1812, she fought the Guerriere, for four hours, leaving the later a total wreck, which could not even be brought into port as a prize. Under Commodore Bainbridge off the coast of Brazil in December of the same year she captured the British Brigate Java after a sharp fight. Again off Cape Verde Islands in a fight that lasted less than an hour, the Constitution, under Captain Stewart, captured both the Frigate Cyane, and the Sloop Levant, although these ships were far superior to the Constitution.

In the midst of the modern warships of the representative countries of the world, old "Iron Sides" anchored in historic Hampton Roads, will be one of the most interesting and educational exhibits of the Exposition.

## WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington D. C., April 8, 1907. There has just been sprung a political sensation that would do credit to the weather with the thermometer at 100 in the shade. It emanates from the inside of the Republican party and most of the Republican papers seem inclined to take it seriously. Whatever there may or may not be behind it, the mere currency of the story shows the deep rooted distrust that the Republican leaders have of each other and the strong undercurrent of opposition that is known to be running against the President and his policies in the financial world.

The facts of the case, as one chooses to class it, are that at a recent dinner either in Washington, Senator Penrose dined not wisely but too well and boasted that there was a plot on foot to block the Roosevelt policies for the next four years by nominating a man not of his choice for the Presidency. Senator Penrose declared, so the story went, that there had been a fund of \$5,000,000 started by high financial interests in New York, including the Standard Oil Company, E. H. Harriman, Jacob Schiff, H. H. Rogers and a number of others, as the nucleus of an immense corruption fund wherewith to secure the nomination in the next republican national convention of any man, so long as he was a man whom the corporations could handle and who was pledged against all of the Roosevelt doctrines.

It was said that there were numbers of real supporters of the President at the table who listened with astonishment to this recital, and regardless of whether the narrator was responsible for his utterances or not, they at once told all that had occurred to the President. Then as

a sequel came a prompt denial from Senator Penrose that he had ever attended the dinner in question, or that he had ever made any such statement as was attributed to him. At the White House on the other hand, while it was not denied that the story had been told to the President it was distinctly stated that the name of Senator Penrose had not been mentioned, and out siders were left to their own speculations as to how much faith the President and his advisers put in the tale. Senator Penrose has always been counted as one of the loyal if not warm supporters of the Administration and it is known that the President helped him substantially in his fight recently in Pennsylvania. The name of Senator Scott of West Virginia and of Senator Elkins are also mixed up in the story of the plot and the dinner, but there is not enough tangible stuff to go on except to suggest that there are things going under the surface in the Republican party, and that however calm and cordial relations may appear to be there are developments ahead that will bear close watching.
