Why You Should Raise Mules.

- 1 They can be raised cheaper than any other stock on the farm.
- 2 Will go into the market sooner than horses.
- 3 Can be handled and worked at 2 years old if properly handled; will do as much work as a 4-year old horse colt and be the better for the mule.
- 4 Are less liable to contract diseases than the horse; you seldom see a blind or spavined mule.
- 5 They instinctively avoid holes and dangerous places. A pair of runaway mules seems to run more from sport than fright, and generally wind up safely. A frightened horse seems to go crazy and dashes into anything and ends up often with a broken leg or is hurt so he has to be killed to end his suffering.
- 6 The mule's steady nerves enable him to live to a greater age than the horse.
- 7 Can stand heat better than the horse. Should you doubt this try a team of each to your binder some sultry day, and I think you will be in favor of the mule. Did you ever hear of a case of founder in a mule from over-drinking or eating on a hot day? How many horses do you know that have been affected from heat or from over-eating or drinking on a very hot day?
- 8 They stand more abuse and hardships than a horse but are very sensitive and sensible animal, and respond quickly to kind treatment by docility and gentleness.
- 9 The profit in mule raising is their quick growth, for they are marketable at three years old. A horse cannot be sold to an advantage until he is five, so the cost of two years feed is saved.
- 10 There is always a steady demand for good mules; a dealer will always handle them. If there are plenty of mules raised in a section of country there will be plenty of mule buyers. Mule buyers are not going where there are no mules to sell. In times of war in any country mules cut an important figure in the contest as the ammunition; mules are always picked up and are very highly prized and high priced. Why? Because they must have them. They endure all kinds of hardships and abuse, and besides the heavy jaw-bone of the mule can masticate any kind of rough food.
- 11 Compare a pair of mules with a steer which will eat as much. A good steer at 3 years old is worth \$60 to \$70. A pair of mules, same age, (good ones) will sell from \$200 to \$250 and have not eaten any more feed.
- 12 As they will not breed they were created for a special purpose—and that is true, honest, durable and valuable workers. Taking the reports of the Year Book of the Department of Agriculture, giving the average value of farm animals in the United States for the past 20 years, we find the value of mules to be from 15 to 33 per cent. higher than horses during the entire period and at no time has the average value of mules been less than of the horse. The demand for them exceeds the supply by about 100 per cent., and the per cent. of increase in favor of the mule will be greater in the next 20 years than in the past. Don't be afraid to raise mules, as they will always be in demand and at very paying prices.

Messrs. Roy W. Bell and John Dawson, of Pearsons, are making an earnest endeavor to induce our progressive farmers to raise and use mules.

Effect of Gypsum on Soil.

To The Gazette.—W. C. of California, makes the following inquiry: "What effect does gypsum have on the soil? Does it enrich it or is its effect only temporary? There is a good deal used here on alfalfa and it nearly doubles the yield of the crop for a few cuttings."

It may be said that gypsum or land plaster is one of the most powerful soil stimulants, and its effect is due, at least very largely, to its stimulating power in liberating valuable plant food elements from the soil. Where gypsum has been very generally used for a time it has commonly ceased to be used almost entirely after a dozen or twenty years.
