WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington D. C., July 1, 1907.

Good old farmer Wilson who by the grace of McKinley and Roosevelt has run the Agricultural Department for the last ten years, and as some claim run it into the ground, has become a laughing stock in Washington and Kansas. It appears that when the green bug was devastating the Kansas wheat fields "farmer Wilson" out of the goodness of his heart decided to give the Kansas farmers some advice how to beat the "bugs" in the future. Plant turkey red wheat, said farmer Wilson, for in 1897 I made experiments and found that turkey red spreads out and withstands the ravages of bugs better than any other variety. But the Millers and Wheat growers all over Kansas began to poke fun at farmer Wilson for making experiments in 1897 with turkey red wheat, as for ten years previously Kansas farmers had grown that variety almost exclusively.

This shows how behind the times the Agricultural Department is in many things and how much it requires reforming. Its statistics are rotten and have been the sport of grafters; many of its so-called scientists are far behind the times as the turkey red wheat episode indicates; the scientists of the Weather Bureau, which is part of the Agricultural Department, are still working on the erroneous plan and theory of the winds and weather adopted 36 ago and the weather forecasts are spoken of as not as reliable as Hicks predictions published month ahead. The Department of Agriculture, as well as other departments of the government, is suffering from dry rot and grafting brought about by so many years of control by Republican partisans, who that party cannot, if it would, get rid of from the party necessity of providing for its camp followers, who if not furnished with what they have, or something equally as good, would turn and rend it. It is not the clerks who are to blame, though some of them are worthless, but the Republican politicians who are in charge of them. If the voters knew one half of the partisan and grafting conditions in most of the departments they would join in the cry of "turn the rascals out!"

Congressman Hull of Iowa was in this city last week and at once proceeded to give out an interview in which he said that "if President Roosevelt should be renominated next year he would get about 40 per cent of the democratic vote in the Northern States". Such an absurd statement is of course untrue, and if the feeling of those who visit Washington is any criterion of the trend of Democrats for or against the President in the Northern States, he would not get one per cent of their votes. At present every Democrat I meet, and they come here from all over the country, is anxious to know who the Democrats should nominate to beat Mr. Roosevelt. Some think Mr. Bryan can defeat him on account of the number of Republicans secretly opposed to the President, but by far the greater number declare they want a candidate upon whom the whole party can unite. The great fear seems to be that if Mr. Bryan is renominated for the third time, he cannot come any nearer being elected than in 1896 or 1900, and some go so far as to say that many voters, who are ardent friends of Mr. Bryan, believe he is one of those leaders like Calhoun, Clay and Blaine who were unable to reach their ambition of being President of the United States.

The optimistic view of Chairman Knapp of the Interstate Commerce Commission that an era of peace between the corporations and the people is dawning is all nonsense. Mr. Knapp says the railroads are accepting the situation and that "any further legislation will have the approval of railroad men as well as the public." If Chairman Knapp really believes what he says, he evidently does not understand the railroad tactics, which at present are to lie low and take what small knocks are coming to them from the Commission by virtue of the very imperfect law passed by the last Congress. The coming Congress is not expected to add any drastic legislation, for President Roosevelt has decided to rest upon his laurels, except to try to take from the States their present power to control common carriers within their borders and so make the general government supreme, and in that the railroads agree with him, but the majority of the people never should acquiesce for they would lose the only power they possess of real railroad control.

One of the astonishing features of our present industrial system is the growth and persistence of vagrancy. Recent statistics show that during the years 1901, 1905, there were 23,964 trespassers killed by the railroads of this country, and that 23,236 more were injured; nearly all of them being tramps. The tramp question has become a national problem. But how shall it be dealt with? Tramps and trusts have been bred in such numbers of late years that they seem to have the same origin and very much the same nature. They reap where they have not sown, and flourish in the same jungle created by unjust legislation. To reform the tariff would be in a large measure to reform the trusts and the tramps.

The Republican scramble to succeed to the Presidency has produced suffering from over exertion, and the candidates are now watching each other from the safe vantage of luxurious summer retreats. As these candidates are the best the Republican party can produce, it must be rather disheartening to their backers to find how little the public think of them. The Knox boom is so dependent upon the corrupt Penrose machine that its fate other and more honest hands would insure its rejection. The Fairbanks boom would not live a day without the careful management of the machinery that has been with so much care erected to control it. The Cannon boom is dependent upon the Speaker for good positions on Committees that give them power and if they are so inclined ample graft for themselves or their favored constituents. Somehow the wheels of the Taft chariot drag heavily in spite of the Roosevelt boosting, and there is evidence that it will result in being merely a center around which the Administration forces can gather. For instance, the Republicans of Kentucky have just declared in favor of a "man like Roosevelt," which shows the desire to keep on the Administration bandwagon and in close communication with the political dispenser. That is all there is to the Republican party in the Southern States.


