WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington D. C., Sept 5, 1907

The Washington Correspondent of the New York Press, though a week behind this correspondence is giving information as to pending Cabinet retirements, gives some details about the real reason for the prospective changes. It is asserted that not one of the Cabinet has endorsed the President's selection of Secretary Taft as his successor and that Secretary Root and Secretary Cortelyou had been led to believe that they would be the favored ones and feel that their "relations" with the Executive have undergone a vital change. As the Press should be good Republican authority for the feeling in Administration circles, this acknowledgement of friction in the President's official family is a political fact of great importance and cannot but have a momentous effect on the presidential campaign. It may result in an open breach in the Republican party, or in any event will lead to lukewarm support of whoever is nominated by the dissatisfied factions. This factional fight for supremacy in the Republican party is vastly to the advantage of the Democrats and should induce them to unite for success. "As the minority party, the Democrats, must show a united front and agreement to essential issues," is the way a very prominent member of the party from New Jersey stated it to me at Atlantic City a few days ago, "or we cannot elect any one." "If we can elect a president there will be a good chance to retain control and in time again impress Democratic policies on the country and there will be ample opportunity for the leaders to develop and attempt to satisfy their ambition. Only one man can be chosen as the candidate for president. Whoever he may be, he must have the support of other leaders, to carry the close and doubtful states. New Jersey does not yet appear to have settled upon a favorite candidate. Mr. Bryan has many friends, but I notice in the Philadelphia Record of August 29th that he has advised friends in that city that he will not be a candidate, because there is serious opposition to his nomination. The report, reputed to have been circulated by Judge Campbell of Ohio, that Judge Parker would seek a renomination for president has been denied by Judge Parker, and was never believed here by well informed politicians. Judge Parker had his opportunity, and neither fortune nor circumstances favoring him and a large number of Mr. Bryan's friends either voting for President Roosevelt or staying at home, he was signally defeated. It would be folly to repeat such a fiasco for history shows that it is not wise in politics to try and change public opinion with regard to candidates when there is serious opposition like Judge Parker and Mr. Bryan have, but rather to seek someone, who both factions cannot refuse to support. Who the candidate will be is yet in the womb of the future and wisdom points to someone being selected who instead of antagonizing anyone on account of previous political action, has no little record that no one can object to him. He must, of course, fill the Democratic requirements of honesty and ability. The Democrats have so much the best of the issues in the coming Presidential campaign, that now, reinforced as they are, by Republican divisions, disagreements on the tariff, the control of trusts, railroad rate regulation, home rule or State rights, and in fact all the issues that are likely to be prominent, it would be an unpardonable sin for the personal fortunes of any man to be made to stand in the way of success.
