THE ELECTIONS.
 Crothers Elected by 9,369.
 Legislature Two-thirds Democratic.
JUDGES BRISCOE AND THOMAS ELECTED TO THE COURT OF APPEALS.
 The unofficial returns shows that Judge Austin L. Crothers has been elected Governor by a plurality of 9,369, of which 4,341 comes from the city. His colleagues on the State ticket—Dr. Joshua W. Hering for Comptroller, Mr. Isaac Lobe Straus for Attorney-General and Mr. Caleb C. Magruder for Clerk of the Court of Appeals—were also elected by substantial majorities. The Democrats will have control of both branches of the next Legislature by a large majority, thus insuring the election to the United States Senate of Hon. William Pinkney White for the short term and Hon. John Walter Smith for the long term.
 In Baltimore city the entire Democratic ticket was successful.
 So far as the legislative ticket is concerned in the city, the Democrats carried three districts solidly—the First, Second and Third—and for the first time since the present district lines have been drawn made inroads in the Fourth district, which is the Republican stronghold, embracing the two biggest negro wards in the city, and is usually counted upon for a solid Republican Delegation to Annapolis. This time the Democrats have elected in the district one Democrat—Carroll—thus making the total Democratic membership in the House of Delegates from the city in the next Legislature 19.
