Ex-President Grover Cleveland died at Princeton, N. J., Wednesday, June 25, 1908. He had had a long illness but his death was unexpected. President Cleveland was one of the really great men of his country and history will accord him a high place in its roll of great Presidents. His family received messages of condolence from all over the world. He was born in 1837; elected sheriff of Buffalo in 1870; elected mayor of Buffalo in 1881; governor of New York in 1882; President of the United States in 1884; defeated Harrison in 1888, and defeated Harrison for the Presidency in 1892; and was married in June 1886. He is survived by a widow and several children.

Republican harmony amongst the New York brethren does not seem to "hang high" for the "harmony dinner" at the Chicago Club on the eve of the Convention in honor of Boss Odell, developed into a laundry for washing the Republican dirty linen. Boss Barnes, of Albany, and Boss Aldrich, of Monroe County, frankly exposed the corrupt methods of each other and nothing but the active services of friends prevented serious damages to the participants in the "mix up". ## WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From Our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington, D. C., July 2, 1908. There has not been a ripple on the Republican political waters in Washington since Taft was nominated. There is no enthusiasm manifested even by the office-holders. The unfortunate attack of sickness of Mr. Sherman, the candidate for Vice-President, has added to the Republican gloom, and already the brethren disputing about how a successor shall be nominated in case he should not recover. The singular omission of the adoption of the usual resolution that the National committee be empowered to fill vacancies, (of course) leaves the matter in doubt and might open up the hardly closed gaping wounds which the action of the Convention left on some of the Republican brethren. In case of the demise of the nominee for Vice-President, the fight between the factions would undoubtedly be renewed over another nomination. The Roosevelt-Taft element who control the majority of the National committee would declare it to be the right of that committee to fill such a vacancy, while their stalwart opponents would want the convention called together again. That the anti-Roosevelt faction have the best of the argument is certain for supposing the head instead of the tail of the ticket was to be unfortunately carried off there would be no doubts of the necessity of reconvention. Still there is no doubt that the great expense of another meeting of the Convention would be a good reason for the Committee to assume that the convention would have given its power to fill vacancies, if the usual resolution had been delegated.

There is much surmise on how far Mr. Taft will go in his letter of acceptance in interpreting the Republican platform, which was apparently purposely made very vague on some issues because the G. O. P. did not dare tell where it stands. It would be cruel, of course, to expect Mr. Taft to express his opinion of the "hot stuff" about our "most exalted servant" who has given a voice to "the highest aspirations of the American people." But Mr. Taft might throw some light on the last plank in his platform and explain to his countryman what is the

meaning of the ambiguous statement that "the trend of the Democracy is towards socialism, while the Republican party stands for wise and regulated individualism." Can he explain the relations of trusts and the Dingley tariff to individualism and socialism without admitting that the tariff has been the trust breeder?

The death of Mr. Cleveland leaves no ex-president living. He was the only Democratic president since the Civil war, and although much vilified and abused, on account of the silver issue, which divided the Democratic party into two factions, yet time, the healer of all troubles, shows that although Mr. Cleveland was right on the free coinage of silver he was wrong when he refused to sign that minor inflation bill for the coinage of the silver seniorage, which the Republicans afterwards adopted with its other inflation measures. The fact that Mr. Cleveland leaves but a very moderate fortune, refutes the charges made that he profited by his position he took on the finances of the country.

Those who opposed him can now join those who twice elected him in the prayer Requisite in pace, for although some of us may not have agreed with all his policies, yet none can doubt his patriotism and sturdy honesty in all his acts. The great heart of the American people will go out in sympathy to his widow whom everyone respects as the best wife and mother that ever occupied the White House. May she ever find shelter under the Everlasting Wings both now and in eternity.
