COUNTY NEWS. Localwise and Otherwise.

We have been obliged to hold for another issue several favors of our correspondents.

The Leonardtown Glee Club will give a concert at Choptank Hall on Thursday, July 23, 1908.

Mrs. Jane Hooper, aged 68 years, died at her residence in Milestone district, Wednesday, July 1, 1908.

During a local storm last Tuesday lightning killed two sheep belonging to James Jordan, of Valley Lee section.

Charles Davis, formerly of Clements, is visiting Niagara Falls, Canada, Buffalo and other points of interest in the North.

The tax-payers of Coburn section are petitioning for a public road to Coburn Wharf on St. Clements Bay. We hope this road will be opened.

Miss Daisie Beavan and Milburn Bonannon took prominent parts in the Fourth Recital at Miss Louisa Craig's school in Baltimore, June 30, 1908.

Rev. William J. Brooks, S. J., has succeeded Father O'Connor S. J., as Pastor of St. John's Church, Hollywood. The appointment will probably be permanent.

There have been local rains in sections of St. Mary's within the past three weeks, but many hundreds have been dry and crops and grass are suffering for rain.

Mr. Camalier and wife left Tuesday for the Blue Mountain House, where Mr. Camalier will attend the meeting of the State Bar Association. They will return next Sunday.

Reports have reached us that Tuesday week there was a severe hail and rain storm in the "Trent Hall" section and that growing corn was cut into ribbons and blown flat.

The Md., Del. & Va. R. R. Co., is running an extra steamer leaving Baltimore on Sunday and Thursday at 3 P. M. This boat touches at our Maryland landing (Stones) and leaves there for Baltimore at 8:30 A. M. on Monday and Friday.

The annual retreat of the Sisters of Charity will begin July 10, in the evening. Rev. Edward W. Raymond, S. J., of St. Joseph's College, Philadelphia will conduct the Exercises. Over fifty Sisters from various parts of the South and West will make the retreat.

The Democratic National Convention met in Denver Tuesday and we have no doubt but that Mr. Bryan was nominated for the Presidency on the first ballot. Lookout.

Captain and Mrs. W. A. Parsons have moved into their new home at Coburn. They will be a great addition to the county. The Richmond News-Leader says of them: Captain and Mrs. W. A. Parsons having sold their beautiful home, "Woodstock," left Monday for their farm on the coast of Maryland to spend a few months on account of the ill health of Captain Parsons, who a short while ago suffered a third stroke of paralysis. He hopes to be greatly benefited by the salt baths and change of air. They will be much missed in this community, where they had endeared themselves to everyone. Mrs. Parsons will be remembered for her loving benevolence and broad charity. The best wishes of their friends go with them.

Tuesday and Wednesday, July 21 and 22 are the days selected for the Law Festival for the benefit of St. Aloysius' Church, Leonardtown. This Festival will afford an admirable opportunity for a reunion of old and new members of the parish and it is to be hoped that all will attend. Members of other parishes are also cordially invited. When the news was received in Leonardtown of Gov. Crothers' announcement of his intention to appoint our fellow-townsmen, B. Harris Camalier Associate Judge to succeed Judge J. Parran Crane there was a general endeavor to see Mr. Camalier and congratulate him. And the congratulations were not confined to Democrats but many Republicans called to tender their congratulations and well wishes. Prominent colored men also congratulated Mr. Camalier. Mr. Camalier has been the recipient of numerous letters congratulating him upon his selection as Judge.

Camalier to be Judge.

To Go on the Bench in August.

(Special Dispatch to the Baltimore Sun.)

Pittsburg, July 3.—Governor Crothers announced on the train tonight en route to Denver that on August 6 next he will appoint Mr. B. Harris Camalier, of St. Mary's county, as judge of the Seventh Judicial circuit to succeed Judge J. Parran Crane.

"I have been notified," said the Governor, "that Judge Crane will reach the age limit and retire on August 6 next. I have determined to appoint in his place Mr. Benjamin Harris Camalier who has the endorsement of every element of the Democratic party in the circuit and is well qualified for the place. He is at present State's Attorney of St. Mary's county, having been elected in that County by 800 majority."

Mr. Camalier is one of the best-known Democrats in the State. He ran three times for Congress on the Democratic ticket against Congressman Sydney E. Mudd, being defeated each time, but leading a forlorn hope with a spirited determination that he win many friends. His appointment by the Governor will hold until November, 1909, when the next general election will be held. This is the fifth judicial appointment the Governor will have made since he took office.

The announcement of the Governor will shut off an, fight among Democrats in the circuit over the appointment of Judge Crane's successor.

Mr. J. Frank Smith, of St. Mary's county, is on the train with the Governor.
