The boiling or filtration of drinking water, the pasteurization of milk, and the thorough washing of raw fruits and vegetables, are valuable safeguards in the prevention of typhoid fever. Protection against flies and other insects is also important. The avoidance of all vegetables fertilized by the use of so called "night-soil" is another necessary and wise precaution.

As we go to press the report reaches us that a large rick of straw at "Bushwood" was burned this morning. The rick was about 20 feet from the barn, and the barn was saved by strenuous efforts of neighbors. Had the barn caught fire the dwelling would have been in serious danger. Last Tuesday night, a tenant house on the same farm, occupied by Ferd Carter and family was burned, the occupants barely escaping with their lives. It is thought the fires were of incendiary origin.

Feast of the Sacred Heart.

This feast will be kept in Sacred Heart Church on Friday of this week; two Messes will be said, one at 6:30 A. M. by Father Kelly, S. J., another at 8 o'clock by Father C. S. Lancaster, S. J., who was Pastor of Sacred Heart Parish for many years. Benediction will follow the second Mass. The solemnity of the Feast will be kept on Sunday next; Masses at 6:30 and 9:30 A. M. The second will be a High Mass at which the parish societies, will be present. A procession of the Blessed Sacrament will follow the Mass. The Blessed Virgin's, and Angel's Societies will take part in the procession. At 7:15 P. M. there will be a reception of Promoters and new members into the League of the Sacred Heart.

When the Rev. Wm. J. Stanton, S. J. of Medley's Neck ascended the altar to deliver the eulogy on the lamented pastor he warmly congratulated those who were present on the warmth of their love and devotion to their dear priest, as shown by the unusual large number in attendance.

Father Stanton took for his text, "Thou art a priest forever according to the order of Melchizedek." In eloquent and beautiful language he showed that there is no altar no sacrifice, and as the Catholic Church alone has her altar and retains that essential junction of all religious belief—the great Sacrifice—so she alone has the true Priesthood that was declared enduring to the end of time. It was as a member of that long and glorious line of Priesthood that they still retained and honored the memory of their beloved Pastor Father Richley.


