overawe their adversaries,—directly

was brought up in the rear by the  
company of musketeers, who wheel-  
ed into the line of march, as the  
last of the marshalled followers of  
the body passed from beneath the  
shade of the mulberry. The bell of  
the Chapel of St. Mary's tolled  
whilst the train moved, at a mea-  
sured pace, towards the church  
door, where, being met by Father  
Pierre, the corpse was deposited in  
the aisle; and the good priest, with  
such despatch as might comfort  
with the solemnity of the duty, per-  
formed the appointed service of the  
dead, in the presence of the large  
body of spectators who had pressed  
into the building.  
Whilst the crowd was still engag-  
ed as witnesses of this scene, a rumor  
was whispered around that the pro-  
clamation of hue and cry had just  
been put forth by the council. A  
messenger came for Captain Daun-  
tress, who was observed, immedi-  
ately afterward, silently to steal  
forth from the church, and to take  
his way with hasty step towards  
the Proprietary mansion. By de-  
grees, one after another, the specu-  
lators followed, and were soon dis-  
covered in groups scattered about  
the town; until, at last, the corpse  
was left with but few more attend-  
ants than were necessary to perform  
the duties of sepulture.  
Half an hour had scarcely elapsed  
before mounted men were seen
