North Pole Found.

Two Americans, Dr. Frederick A. Cook, of Brooklyn and Lieut. Robt. E. Peary, U. S. N., have reached the North Pole. Both men are noted explorers though the Doctor is not as well known as the Lieutenant, who has made several voyages to the far North in search of the Pole. Dr. Cook has landed at Cape Nagai and received an ovation from the King of Denmark, and is the hero of the hour in Europe. Lieutenant Peary is still in the far North, but is on his way home and we may soon hope to have full accounts of the discovery.

Our Potomac Oyster Grounds.

When the State Shellfish Commission, in collaboration with the U. S. Government's surveyors, made its survey of the natural oyster rocks of St. Mary's the Potomac boundaries of the county were plotted and marked and a considerable area of oyster lands allotted to the local tonging grounds. According to the new chart the line of demarcation between the common-fishing oyster grounds of the Potomac and the local grounds of St. Mary's, begins at Cobb Point Bar Light, thence to the upper bar of St. Catherine's Island, running with the outer shore of the said island to the extremity of its lower bar, thence to the main headland at Waterloo Point and with the shore to Colton's Point, thence to the outside shore of Blackstone's Island and with the shore of the said Island to its southern extremity, thence to the Western end of Heron Island and with the said Island to its Eastern extremity and thence in a straight line to Higgins Point and includes "all bars located to the Northward of the said line. On the published oyster chart of the body of water to the northward of Heron Island between Dukehart's channel and Higgins' Point is called Heron Island sound and is part of the St. Mary's county oyster grounds."

If the work of the Shellfish Survey determines anything, it concludes the controversy as to the Potomac boundary of the St. Mary's oyster grounds and imposes upon our State Oyster Police the duty of protecting these grounds from the depredation of dredgers and scrapers and preserving them for our local tongmen. Marylanders are not allowed to oyster in waters south of a line projected from Virginia headland to headland, and now that our line has been determined, Virginia oystermen should be kept on their side of it.

We hope Commander Howard and the Board of Public Works will issue explicit orders to the State Oyster Police to guard the waters to the north of the Earle-Yates line and prevent depredations therein. Unless this be done, what faith may our people be expected have in the Commission and its survey?

New Hall at Holy Angels.

The new and pretty Hall at Holy Angels' Chapel in Seventh District was formally dedicated to the Muses and the fine arts last Wednesday evening, Sept. 1, when a grand Concert and entertainment was given by the combined talent of four parishes, St. Joseph's, St. Aloysius', St. John's and Sacred Heart. Nearly four hundred came from these and other parts, also to view the hall so lately completed, and to enjoy a program prepared by the best musicians of our County.

The hall, which is the work of contractor John Dean of Milestone, was begun in May and took but three months for completion. The main body or floor is 34x60; the stage is 34x20 and adapted for use as a dining room when the drop curtain is down. There is a gallery for musicians in the front of the hall over the main door; dressing rooms above the stage and a store-room under the stage. Connected with the hall at the rear by a covered stair and passage, is a well appointed kitchen so arranged as to serve for indoor or outdoor dinners, etc.

Everyone was delighted with the hall, so neatly painted and furnished; and after the Concert the large crowd lingered long to test its fitness for the gentle art of dancing. Their approval was unanimous.

Father Kelly wishes to thank most cordially those who furnished the evening's enjoyment—particularly,

the organizers, the Misses Madeleine Bailey of Sacred Heart parish, Marguerite Abell, of St. Aloysius', Agnes Johnson, of St. Joseph's, and the little dramatic troupe from St. John's.

The hall will be next used for the autumn festival, Tuesday, Sept. 28.

ORDER OF PUBLICATION.

In the Circuit Court for St. Mary's Co. No. 1130 N. E.

R. T. Dawson & Co., John E. Hurst & Co., and Armstrong, Gator & Co., all of Baltimore City, Plaintiffs.

James E. Forrestall and others, defendants.

THE object of this suit is to procure a decree for the sale of the real estate of Anastasia S. Benville, late of Saint Mary's County, deceased, for the payment of the debts of said deceased.

The bill states that said Anastasia S. Benville departed this life about the first of August, 1908, indebted to R. T. Dawson & Co. on judgment in the sum of \$381.38, with interest from September 13, 1904, and \$3.05 costs on same; to John E. Hurst & Co., in the sum of \$478.86, on judgment, with interest from September 14, 1904 and \$8.05 costs on same; and to Armstrong, Gator & Co., on judgment, in the sum of \$338.63, with interest from September 13, 1904 and \$8.05 costs on same and leaving the following persons as her heirs at law, namely, James E. Forrestall, John T. Forrestall, William Forrestall, Walter Forrestall, Anna Farrell, Sallie Mahoney, Anna W. Bohanna, Lawrence P. Williams, Margaret Warnick, Anna Parkhurst, Frank Barnes and James Barnes, and that the said Sallie Mahoney, Frank Barnes and James Barnes are non-residents of the State of Maryland.

That said Anastasia S. Benville died, seized and possessed of the following real estate, lying and being in Saint Mary's County, namely, one lot or parcel of land containing five acres, improved by two dwelling houses and a store house, called and known as "Smithville" or "The Elm" and also thirty acres of woodland detached therefrom. All the said real estate being located in the First Election District of said County.

That administration on the personal estate of said deceased has been granted by the Orphans Court of Saint Mary's County, to the said James E. Forrestall, but that said personal estate is insufficient to pay the debts of said deceased.

It is thereupon by the Court this 16th day of August, 1909, ordered, that the plaintiffs cause a copy of this order together with the object and substance of the Bill to be inserted in some newspaper published in Saint Mary's County, once a week for four successive weeks, before the 30th day of September, 1909, giving notice to the non-resident defendants in said bill and warning them to appear in this Court, in person or by attorney, on or before the 11th day of October, 1909, to show cause, if any they have, why a decree should not pass as prayed.
