The Commencement Exercises at the St. Mary's Female Seminary will take place at 11 o'clock A. M. on Tuesday, June 21, 1910.

Representative Charles F. Scott, of Kansas, has introduced a bill in Congress providing for the establishment of an animal quarantine station in Maryland.

Charlotte Hall Academy will commence on June 16, Leonard Hall, on June 20th, and St. Mary's Academy and St. Mary's Seminary, on June 21st.

Last Tuesday, June 14, was the one hundred and thirty-third anniversary of the adoption of the national flag and generally known as Flag Day.

On the evening of June 7, the Board of Education, held a meeting and elected Miss Bruce Colton as teacher in the South Highland School, of Birmingham, Alabama.

We print on our first page the examination questions for pupils of the St. Mary's Public Schools. They show that the pupils are given a good education and that a boy or girl who has graduated from the public schools of our county is well equipped for life's work.

The streets of Leonardtown are certainly in bad condition because of the abnormally heavy traffic over them occasioned by the building of the State Road. But, the Town Commissioners are doing everything in their power to keep the streets passable. Nearly every day Capt. A. A. Lawrence, a member of the Board of Commissioners, may be seen superintending the filling up of some hole in the traction engines and cars have cut in the streets or opening drains to carry off the heavy rainfall. Governor Crothers is to inaugurate next month his campaign for up-to-date farming methods in Maryland. The campaign to be started in Southern Maryland will be carried on all over the State. The Governor has requested the commission appointed by him to investigate and discuss the best and most profitable farming methods, to meet in Baltimore June 24, when plans for the campaign will be arranged, including the selection of the county seat in which the first gun will be fired, the date and the list of speakers who will discuss agriculture for the benefit of those who farm to live as well as those who live to farm. The St. Mary's representatives on the commission are: Dr. C. V. Hayden, Dr. L. B. Johnson, Dr. F. F. Greenwell, J. Frank Smith, John W. Renchan, Charles S. Grason.




