By the provisions of Chapter 291, Acts of 1910, judges and clerks of Elections in this county are no longer required to appear before the Election Supervisors for examination or to be sworn in. They may now take the oath of office before a local Justice of the Peace or a Notary Public and forward same to the Supervisors.

At Tuesday's meeting of the Election Supervisors the Judges and Clerks for the primaries and election were named. The advertisement appears in another column. Wm. Cates the Federal Commissioner, the contract was not then awarded. The new monument will be from 85 to 100 feet high and the old monument will likely be removed to the old prison graveyard and there be re-erected with a suitable inscription.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the St. Mary's Female Seminary, held at the institution on Commencement day, the following resolutions were passed by a rising vote:

"As we assemble here today beneath these venerable walls of learning to perform the important sacred duties entrusted to us, we are compelled to pause in grief and sorrow over the new made grave of our dear and valued and cherished friend and member, JAMES THOMAS BROMO, who departed this life on the 11th of June, 1910.

A comrade in the battle of life and a zealous member of this board has fallen!
He was born and has always resided here on this historic spot, and after a life of nearly sixty-three years of usefulness, honor and kindness, it is fitting and proper that he should be laid to rest amid these beautiful and touching surroundings which were always so near and dear to his heart.

Like his illustrious father, Dr. John M. Bromo, to whom is due the very life and success of this great institution, his heart and his efforts were ever directed to the uplifting, the comfort, the pleasures and the happiness of all who have come within these walls, and of the many young ladies, and their relatives throughout the entire State who have been educated here in the past fifty years or more, there is not one in some way, who has not felt their kindness, usefulness and hospitality.

Be it resolved therefore, by the Board of Trustees of the St. Mary's Female Seminary, that whilst humbly bowing to the will of Our Heavenly Father, who has taken our dear friend from us, we do so with sorrow we mourn the death of our esteemed and valued friend and member, JAMES THOMAS BROMO.
Resolved that in his death this institution has sustained a great and almost irreparable loss and which will be felt and deplored to the utmost limits of the State, and especially by the people of its own native county who loved him for his spotless character, his amiability, his charity to all.
Resolved, That these resolutions be recorded among the minutes of our proceedings, and a copy of same be sent to the Secretary of his noble and devoted wife, his two kind and idolized daughters, with the earnest prayer of each member of this Board, that they will find solace and consolation in the words of Holy Writ, "Whom I love, I call, and these I have predestined."

Resolved further that as an additional mark of respect for his memory this Board adjourn after only transacting its imperative duties.







RIGHT OVER WOOD SHINGLES




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
