VITAL WASHINGTON NEWS.

LODGE AND TEDDY ARE PAISI

Senator Henry Cabot Lodge of Massachusetts is posing as the bonum friend of Roosevelt. He says T. R. will campaign for his re-election, and Roosevelt has not denied that he will go to Lodge's rescue. It was only recently that LaFollette of Wisconsin, in a speech in the Senate, exposed this same Lodge as the unscrupulous tool of the railroads and other special interests. Lodge is by training and nature unfitted to represent any part of the United States in the Senate. He can not outgrow the ancient illusion that the business of the Senate is to legislate for the rich, regardless of the rights of the poor. Unless all signs read falsely, Mr. Lodge of Massachusetts, who declares the consumer is a myth, will be retired to private life, yes, and regardless of whether the ex-president indorses or refuses to indorse.

"UNCLE JOE" HAS NOT RETIRED.

"God willing, I'll be back in Washington next session, and it will be for the Republican majority to determine who shall be speaker."

So spoke "Uncle Joe" Cannon the other day. Speaker Cannon has not the least intention of retiring from the speakership, and the public is only fooling itself to think otherwise. Cannon has served the corporate interests of the country long and faithfully, and if the next House should be Republican, "Uncle Joe" will no doubt be rewarded with another term as speaker.

HIDING HIGH PRICES.

To prove that the new tariff has not increased the cost of Life's necessities, standpatters cite schedules in which the quoted prices of manufactured articles are the same as before the Aldrich-Taft law was passed. The absurdity of this attempt to deceive consumers is manifest.

It is notorious that the textile trust took heroic measures to keep price quotations normal for this season by making lighter weight goods, and using poorer material.

Their example was followed by foreign makers who exported to this country a cheaper grade of cotton stockings at the old prices. The net result, of course, is that the consumers must purchase more frequently, because shoddy goods wear out quickly.

Obviously, the aggregate cost of Life necessities grows steadily as articles bought deteriorate in quality.

This method of hiding high prices has been boldly justified by eastern trust officials as legitimate business.

Sleeping in the Open Air.

"Directions for Living and Sleeping in the Open Air," is the title of a pamphlet being sent out today by the Maryland Association of the Prevention and Relief of Tuberculosis from its office at 15 East Pleasant street, Baltimore.

The pamphlet is meant to be a handbook of information for anybody who desires to sleep out of doors in his own home. It emphasizes the outdoor sleeping is as desirable for the sick. H. Wirt Steel, secretary of the association, calls attention to the fact that this is the season of the year when it is easiest to acquire the sleeping out of doors.

"If people would begin to sleep out of doors now, they would not mind it at all when the cold, long nights of winter come, but contrary they would thoroughly enjoy the experience, provided, of course, their bodies are kept warm by sufficient covering."

Some of the subjects on which the pamphlet treats are how to take the open air treatment in a tenement house, how to build a small shack or cabin on a flat roof in the city, how to make one comfortable out doors either in hot or cold weather, how to arrange a porch on a country house, how to build a cheap porch, construction of tents and tent houses, the kinds of beds and bedding to use in outdoor sleeping, and various other topics. The book is well illustrated and attractively prepared, and will be sent free of charge to anyone applying for it at the office of the association.

The object of the book is to suggest, particularly to consumptives who cannot secure admission to a sanatorium, how they can be treated

at home under the direction of a physician. In view of the fact that there are less than 600 hospital beds in the State for consumptives, and fully 5000 who should be in hospitals, the association urges that more attention be paid to sleeping in properly provided places at home, and that in every case the best be made of the patient's environment. The officers of the association estimate that fully 1000 Baltimoreans, including both sick and well, have acquired the outdoor sleeping habit, as evidenced by the glimpses of roof tents, window tents, sleeping porches, and shacks in all parts of the city.

Poor Richard's Maxims.

If a postal savings bank is established on the proposed lines, it might be well to recognize on the deposit card and on the bonds that are to be issued the wholesome maxims of Franklin, the first American philosopher. Poor Richard's sayings would in this way have a deservedly wide circulation and would be read by the plain people greatly to their advantage as they were read in the early days of the Republic. Here are some of these maxims, taken from the Pennsylvania almanac for 1788, of which Benjamin Franklin, under the pseudonym of Richard Sanders, was editor and publisher.

Many words will not fill a bushel. God helps them who help themselves.

The used key is always bright. Do not squander time; time is the stuff that life is made of. The sleeping fox catches no poultry.

"Time enough," always proves little enough. He that riseth late must trot all day and shall scarce overtake his business at night. Laziness travels so slowly that poverty soon overtakes him. Drive thy business; let not thy business drive thee. Early to bed and early to rise make a man healthy, wealthy and wise. He that lives upon hope will die fasting. Industry pays debts. Diligence is the mother of good luck. One to-day is worth two to-morrows. Have you something to do to-morrow, do it to-day. The cat in gloves catches no mice. Little strokes fell great oaks. Employ thy time well if thou meanest to gain leisure. Since thou are not sure of a minute do not throw away an hour. Trouble springs from idleness and grievous toil from needless ease. Fly pleasures and they will follow thee. Three removes are as bad as a fire. Want of care does more damage than want of knowledge. Do not overuse workmen is to leave them thy purse open. If thou wouldst have a faithful servant and one that thou likest, serve thyself. For want of a nail the shoe was lost; For want of a shoe the horse was lost; For want of a horse the rider was lost; Being overtaken and slain by the enemy; All for want of care about a horse-shoe nail. What maintains one vice would bring up two children. Many a little make a mickle. Fools make feasts and wise men eat them. Wise men learn by others' harms. When the well is dry they know the need of water. Wouldst thou know the value of money try to borrow some. He that goes a-borrowing goes a-sorrowing. Prides as loud a beggar as Want and a great deal more saucy. Pride that dines on Vanity sups on Contempt. Pride breakfasted with Plenty, dined with Poverty and supped with Infamy. The second vice is lying; the first is running into debt. Lying rides upon Debt's back. It is hard for an empty bag to stand upright. Creditors have better memories than debtors. They have a short Lent who owe money to be paid at Easter. Experience keeps a dear school, but fools will learn in no other and scarcely in that. Flow hard while sluggards sleep, and you shall have corn to sell and to keep. He that by the plow would thrive, himself must either hold or drive.
