John Griffin Carlisle, who was Secretary of the Treasury under Grover Cleveland in the latter's second administration as President, died at 10.50 o'clock, on the night of July 31, 1910, in the Hotel Wolcott, New York City. He was 75 years old.

Mr. Carlisle was born in Kentucky, September 5, 1836. He was a member of the Forty-fifth Congress and was elected Speaker of the Forty-eighth Congress, serving three successive terms. He succeeded the late Senator James Beck in the United States Senate, which position he resigned to become Secretary of the Treasury in Cleveland's Cabinet.

A fire starting at 2 A. M., July 31, ultimo, in a stable caused a \$200,000 loss in Cambridge, Md. The most up-to-date business buildings in the city were destroyed.

VITAL WASHINGTON NEWS.

Protection makes politics a business proposition.

In the last congressional election for instance, the tariff trusts spent large sums of money to bring about the election of candidates who had secretly or otherwise pledged themselves to revision upward.

These contributions to the Republican campaign fund were investments in every sense of the word. The trusts figured that if Republicans were elected the tariff on the particular commodities in which they dealt would be kept sufficiently high to bar out competition and assure them monopolies on American markets.

With this end in view the tariff trusts and combinations of manufacturers contributed liberally to Republican campaign funds.

The expenditure of this tainted money enabled the Republicans to dominate Congress! The tariff was revised upward! The manufacturers were given their monopolies! Prices were boosted!

The result is that the people are now repaying to the tariff trusts, in increased prices, not only the amounts invested as contributions to the Republican campaign fund, but they are also paying a profit varying from 100 to 1000 per cent. beside.

And in the meantime the big corporate interests have taken the reins of government out of the hands of the people, into their own, for safe keeping. Such is the milk in the protection cocoon.

GOVERNMENT BY MONEY.

It cost Joseph C. Sibley \$40,698.83 to win the Republican nomination for Congress in the Twenty-eighth District of Pennsylvania. Mr. Sibley received 10,446 votes at the primaries, and each vote represented an expenditure of nearly \$4. As his plurality was only 689 it is fair to say that his nomination was brought about by the sheer power of money.

At the primaries in the Thirteenth District of Pennsylvania John Dalzell spent \$9,200, most of which was contributed by protected manufacturers. The combined expenditures of Sibley and Dalzell in these two districts were nearly \$50,000. Their combined salaries as Representatives in Congress for two years will be only \$30,000. Their nominations, therefore, cost almost \$20,000 more than the emoluments of their office, exclusive of mileage and stationery allowances.

Contributions to the party of revision upward is a paying business investment, particularly to the tariff trusts.

Men will always pay thousands to politicians or to party funds in the hope of getting back millions. Make the tariff one for revenue only, and you cut off a leading cause of political dishonesty and corruption.

THE DEMOCRATIC CAMPAIGN.

The democrats need gain but twenty-two seats in the next house of representatives to obtain a numerical majority.

The present republican majority is forty-three. At least eighteen republicans hold their seats by a margin less than 1,000 votes.

Twenty-nine republican seats in the present house of representatives are held by less than 2,000 votes.

Every local democratic committee has a heavy responsibility. The character of the nominee in every district is supremely important. Democracy cannot challenge the enemy with weak or colorless candidates. The people want absolute assurance that the men they vote for will stand four square when the first real test comes in organizing the next congress.

Democratic candidates must stand on an unequivocal platform of real tariff revision.

The democratic party, through both national and local organizations, must be prepared to shoulder full responsibility for removing tariff burdens from the people.

The democrats have a real issue to carry them to victory, and can lose only by failure to grasp its significance.

TAFT WON'T INTERFERE.

The new railroad rate law will not be used to keep down railroad rates.

Correspondents at the summer capital at Beverly, Mass. recently got this news. It means that the strongest feature of the new railway law is to be a dead letter under the Taft administration.

The section of law referred to is that giving power to the interstate commerce commission, on complaint against an increase, to suspend any freight rate for election months pending decision as to the justice of the rate. This section was forced into the law by the democrats and insurgents and was strongly opposed by President Taft and the Aldrich-Cannon regulars.

Being hostile to this feature of the new law, President Taft will not use it to prevent the railroads from increasing their rates.

HOW IT LOOKED.

The next day after Representative Havens (democrat) changed a 10,000 Republican majority into a 5,000 Democratic majority, in the Rochester, N. Y. Congressional district, a newspaper man asked a prominent Republican standpatter if he did not think the Democrats would carry the next House, whereupon the disgusted and crestfallen Republican replied "Carry the next House? Hell! If the Republican members keep on dying, they'll carry the present House."
