Last Monday the power boat, Katherine, 38 feet long and 8 feet, 9 inches, beam, was launched at Leonardtown. The "Katherine" was built by David Milburn for B. Kennedy Abell and is by long odds, the finest power boat in these waters. She is equipped with a 12 H. P. Lamb Engine and has a splendidly appointed cabin.

W. L. Amoss, of Harford county, the father of Farmers' Institute work in Maryland, has been turned down and Dr. Richard S. Hill has been appointed Director in his stead. Dr. Hill is a good farmer and will no doubt make a good Director, but he will have to make an exceptionally good one to reach the high standard of his predecessor. The farmers of Maryland owe a great deal to Mr. Amoss.

A Joint Institute is to be held in Washington at the Business High School building for the counties of Montgomery, Prince George's, St. Mary's and Charles from September 5th to 9th. Cards giving particulars will soon be issued to the teachers. It is expected that this Institute will be the best ever held for this section, and teachers should therefore welcome the opportunity to listen to lecturers who have had years of experience and thereby gain useful information bearing upon their important work. All can learn something—not only those who will search for the first time next year, but those also who have had years of experience. The meeting will be inspiring and helpful.—Esquire.

The New Primary Law.

The Attorney General having ruled that the law enacted at the last session of the Legislature applies to Congressional candidates, the two leading parties, which are the only ones affected by it, have fixed August 30, as the day for choosing candidates. Any person may become a candidate in the primaries by filing a notice with the supervisors at least fifteen days before August 30, together with twenty-five dollars. This notice must be given and the assessment paid in each county in the district and in Baltimore, if part of the district is within the city. The primaries for both parties are held on the same day just as general elections are held except that each party has a separate ballot box and the ballots are different colors. In the counties the polls open at 8 A. M. and close at 5 P. M. Only one candidate of a party files a notice with the supervisors prior to 15 days before August 30, then a primary election for that party is not necessary and the candidate is entitled to have his name placed upon the official ballot at the general election without further formality. In case of a contest at the polls the board of supervisors canvass the returns and certify the result to the Secretary of State. This procedure relates to Congressional candidates. Next year when local candidates and State officers are to be voted for the method of voting for State officers includes the right of the voter to mark his ballot for his first, second and third choice, etc., and the delegates chosen are bound to so vote at the State Convention.

Telephone Cable in Chesapeake Bay

The laying of the armored submarine cable beneath the waters of Chesapeake Bay has lately been completed. This is one of the most notable improvements in telephone facilities in this section of the country that has ever been undertaken and has attracted quite a little attention throughout the technical world because of the many interesting features of the new cable.

The cable is five miles long. It contains sixteen pairs of wires, and it was strung from Love Point on Kent Island to Sandy Point, north east of Annapolis. Shipping and laying this cable was a tremendous task, because of its great weight and length.

When this cable left the New York plant of the Western Electric Company, which manufactured it, it was in four sections, each of which, strung on an immense reel, contained 6,000 feet of lead covered and armored cable. Each spool with its load weighed 58,000 pounds.

The cable was taken from the four reels at the dock on West street, New York, and wound in a "figure eight" on board a barge. The barge was towed to Chesapeake Bay and the cable was then laid without mishap.

The installation of this cable makes possible a short cut for telephone subscribers in Baltimore who may wish to talk to people in Delaware or on the eastern shores of Maryland and Virginia. It means a saving of fifty miles between Baltimore and Cape Charles.

The Bell Telephone Company of Pennsylvania has run additional wires to the terminals of this cable from points in the southern part of the eastern shore, Pennsylvania, and from Baltimore and Annapolis to the other end.

The lead covered cable is armored with layers of jute and wire. This outer covering is believed to be capable of withstanding the ravages of the deep for many years.




