Why Meat is High.

Thirty-five per cent. is the amount of profit Armour & Co., forced the public to pay last year. This became known through a statement submitted by Armour & Co. in connection with the listing of a bond issue of \$30,000,000 on the stock exchange. The company by its own showing made a gross profit of \$10,582,000 for the year 1909 on a capital stock of \$20,000,000 and earned a surplus of \$7,127,926, or the equivalent of a dividend of 35.6 per cent. As the price of beef was boosted with the beginning of 1910 it would appear that in the opinion of Armour & Co., a 35.6 per cent. profit on capital stock is not simple, even though the commodity involved is one of the necessities of life. Armour & Co. is one of the best trust firms which enjoyed perfect immunity from prosecution by the government until Federal Judge Landis of Chicago, an insurgent, forced the Taft administration to take cognizance of the fact that the beef trust was illegally holding up the public.
