**Fall From Great Heights.**  
 Fall from great heights not neces-  
 sarily fatal in their results are be-  
 coming so frequent in these days of  
 aeroplaning that it may prove of in-  
 terest to describe some famous  
 achievements in this line.

Writing in 1841 of a fall from an  
 immense altitude which did not re-  
 sult in death, a French observer,  
 M. Manzini, declares that he had  
 searched in vain in the annals of  
 science for a similar case.

We can well believe it, says the  
 Lancet. The victim or patient was  
 a taspissier, who had been engaged  
 in putting up decorations on the oc-  
 casion of the belated obsequies of  
 Napoleon the Great in the lofty  
 dome of the Church of the Invalides  
 in Paris.

When busy moving a ladder on  
 the top of a high scaffolding he over-  
 balanced himself and in obedience  
 to some instinct jumped clear of the  
 ladder and the platform, crying to  
 his fellow workmen, as only a  
 Frenchman would, "Tiens, me  
 voila parti!"

With these cheerful words on his  
 lips he fell eighty-two feet, bound-  
 ing in one place off the roof of a lit-  
 tle dome, which caused him to de-  
 scribe a second parabola in the air,  
 and landing finally, feet first on the  
 slate roof of a small sacristy, he  
 falling through the slates, he  
 astride a rafter, where he was found  
 sitting surprised but coherent, for  
 he was able to give his name and ad-  
 dress when asked for them.

He had no recollection of this and  
 became unconscious when put to  
 bed shortly afterward under the  
 care of the great Pasquier. His in-  
 sensibility lasted a very short time,  
 however, and he made an extraor-  
 dinarily rapid recovery, having re-  
 mained no apparent injuries either  
 external or internal. At the end of  
 a month Pasquier found him quite  
 well.

Among classic English falls may  
 be mentioned that of a steepjack  
 who in 1890 fell from the top of the  
 Church of St. George in Bolton-le-  
 Moors to the ground, the whole dis-  
 tance having been some 120 feet.  
 The man's skull struck some sheet  
 lead upon the earth and left its im-  
 pact upon it, but though this fall  
 was quite unbroken as in the pre-  
 vious cases by scaffolding, rocks  
 and so forth the man was only slight-  
 ly injured and resumed work in a  
 few days.

Recently a man with his boots on  
 fell from the top of a cliff at Dover  
 the height of which was afterward  
 found to be 400 feet. He was pick-  
 ed up floating insensible in some  
 five feet of water, but his boots  
 were off, which proves that he must  
 have retained sufficient conscious-  
 ness on reaching the water to enable  
 him to draw his boots from his feet.  
 Both these cases are well attested.

**The Poultry Yard.**  
 Warm wheat for breakfast makes  
 a delicious meal. It is the best  
 shell out the eggs.  
 Plenty of time to use the time. If  
 you haven't a cutter use an old ax  
 or a hatchet, but break the bones in  
 small pieces.  
 Inferile eggs taken from the in-  
 cubator need not be an entire loss.  
 They may be boiled and used as  
 chick food.  
 Pigeon-grass is becoming widely  
 distributed in the East. The seed  
 has much nutritive value and is fine  
 for turkeys and chickens.  
 Takes more to fat a hen now than  
 it did two months ago, but don't  
 winter the hens that are so old they  
 may die before spring. Feed them  
 well, keep them warm and let them  
 go when the first chance you have.  
 Greenfeed must not be forgotten.  
 Some feed green rye when it can be  
 had, others give sprouted oats, others  
 beans and turnips and cabbage, and  
 others add out clover hay to the  
 mash. All of the greens mentioned  
 are good.

Salt is an essential for poultry as  
 for human beings or animals. But  
 it is not wise to feed it by itself.  
 The better way is to season the food  
 whenever that can be done. The  
 warm mash in the winter gives an  
 excellent opportunity to supply it.  
 A little more corn may be added  
 to the evening grain ration, as the  
 hens will need more heating food.  
 On the farm of the writer the winter  
 grain ration consists of two parts  
 whole corn, one part oats, and one  
 part wheat. During the summer  
 only one part corn is given to two  
 parts oats and one part wheat.

If porcelain eggs are used for nest  
 eggs in cold weather, cover them  
 with light flannel, or some other  
 material, to avoid torture to the hens.  
 An artificial egg is always of the  
 same temperature as the atmosphere,  
 while the temperature of a hen's  
 body is about 102 degrees. It may  
 readily be seen that in freezing  
 weather these ice-cold eggs cause  
 the hens to get chilled.—Farm  
 Journal.
