The Population of Maryland.

The official census figures for the State of Maryland follow, and the figures for 1900 are also given for comparison. The increase in population in the last decade was 9 per cent. or 106,406.

Under the census, Allegany, Caroline and Garrett will each gain a member of the House of Delegates, and Harford and Queen Anne's will each lose 1 unless a recount by the State should show the Federal census to be incorrect, and it is hardly probable that the State will re-enumerate these counties.

The first Federal census in 1790, gave Maryland a population of but 319,728. The census of 1790 shows a population of 15,544, of which 6,965 were slaves. Charles county had a population of 20,613, 10,085 of which were slaves. Calvert had a total of 8,652 of which 4,805 were slaves.

In 1790, Frederick was the most populous county in the State, having then a population of 30,791 of which 3,641 were slaves. In 1790 there were but 13,508 people in Baltimore town and precincts and 1,255 of them were slaves.
