**Among The Senators.**  
 For much longer than the session  
 lasted the Senators remained on the  
 floor chattering and joking with  
 each other. There was some seri-  
 ous talk of politics among the older  
 men, but it was evident that noth-  
 ing like a legislative program has  
 agreed on, unless it be called an  
 agreement that in certain quarters  
 it is felt that nothing should be at-  
 tempted at the short session. That  
 feeling is not shared by the insur-  
 gents, or by all the Democrats, but  
 they realize that they are still in the  
 minority.

An interesting group from a poli-  
 tical point of view was one formed  
 by Senator Aldrich, of Rhode Island,  
 Senator Carter, of Montana, and  
 Senator Bailey, of Texas, one of the  
 leading Democrats who is often to  
 be seen in talk with the Republican  
 leaders. Mr. Penrose, of Pennsyl-  
 vania, also had a chat with Mr. Ald-  
 rich, while Mr. Smoot, of Utah, and  
 Mr. Crane, of Massachusetts, seem-  
 ed to talk with everybody.

Most of the defeated members  
 have learned by now to take their  
 medicine well. Senator Keen, of  
 New Jersey, was as merry as ever  
 and Senator Beveridge was even  
 more chatty than usual, joining  
 heartily in jokes at his own expense.  
 But no one seemed to mind defeat  
 less than Mr. Depew, of New York,  
 who will be succeeded by a Demo-  
 crat after this session. He seemed  
 to take the whole thing as a joke  
 and insisted on his friends regard-  
 ing it in the same light.

"Why," he said, laughing gayly,  
 as he was drawn into a crowd of  
 sympathetic friends, "I haven't  
 seen you since I died."  
 They all laughed at that, and none  
 more loudly than he.  
 Mr. La Follette, fresh from his  
 victories at home, is wearing his  
 pompadour more flowing than ever.  
 It has whitened noticeably in the  
 last six months, however, and with  
 his intense expression his resem-  
 blance to David Belasco is remark-  
 able. He is evidently longing for a  
 fight, and even his jokes are belli-  
 cose.

"This weather has taken some of  
 the ink out of your curls," a friend  
 remarked to him.  
 "They will come back," was Mr.  
 La Follette's brief reply.—New  
 York Times.
