Will The Elosser Case Remain a Mystery?
 Charles E. Twigg and Miss Grace
 Elosser, who were engaged and
 were on the eve of being married,
 were found dead in the parlor of the
 Elosser home, in Cumberland, on
 December 31. There was appar-
 ently no reason to suppose that either
 had any intention of committing
 suicide. He was in prosperous cir-
 cumstances, with a fortune of some
 \$40,000. She was making every
 preparation for the wedding.
 Dr. Harrington, the city health
 officer, and Dr. Barker, a chemist,
 performed an autopsy on the bodies.
 They came to the conclusion that
 both had been killed by taking
 cyanide of potassium. Dr. John R.
 Little and Dr. Arthur H. Hawkins
 were convinced that death was
 caused by carbon monoxide, gener-
 ated by a gas stove which stood only
 four feet from the couple. They
 conducted a test, and in the same
 room where the dead bodies were
 found enough deadly gas was gen-
 erated to kill cats that were confin-
 ed. Dr. C. E. Glaser, of Baltimore,
 and Dr. S. E. Lynch, chief chemist
 of the District of Columbia, made
 independent tests of the body of the
 victims and both came to the con-
 clusion that death was caused by
 carbon monoxide.

The doctors and chemists who
 made an analytical investigation of
 the contents of the stomach found
 distinct traces of cyanide. How
 the cyanide got there is still unde-
 termined. Dr. W. R. Foard, the
 first physician to reach the scene,
 Dr. Thomas W. Koon and Dr. Geo.
 L. Broadrip all hold to the theory
 of cyanide poisoning, in spite of the
 monoxide tests and reports.
 This disagreement between the
 experts is not a mere technical dif-
 ference as to the manner in which
 death was caused. It goes to the
 root of the case. If death was caus-
 ed by carbon monoxide, it was clearly
 the result of an accident. If it
 was caused by cyanide of potassium,
 it points to either suicide or murder.

There are many questions that have
 arisen in this case that have not yet
 been satisfactorily answered, and
 probably never will be. Few cases
 have attracted such wide attention
 or have been followed with such in-
 terest. There are no witnesses,
 apparently, who can tell us how they
 met death. The experts disagree as
 to the cause, each side stating its
 conclusions with equal positiveness.
 And, in spite of the official reports,
 the Elosser case is likely to go down
 in history as one of those unsolved
 mysteries which baffle investigation
 and defy the most careful analysis.

Are We Wiser Than Chinaman?
 Over in China they are having
 floods and a famine. They have been
 having these things for years, but
 that is so far away that we don't
 pay much attention to it until some
 missionary tells the story and takes
 up a collection and now and then
 we load a ship with provisions and
 send it to the unfortunates who are
 starving.
 The Chinamen of today are suffer-
 ing because of the foolishness of
 their forefathers.
 Hundreds of years ago the moun-
 tains and hills in which the great
 rivers of China have their sources
 were covered with heavy timber.
 The Chinamen neither knew nor
 cared anything about meteorology,
 and they cut all these trees for tim-
 ber and fuel. Then when the rain
 fell and the snow melted the water
 rushed down the steep hillsides,
 tearing away the soil, grinding
 down into the gravel and carrying
 it down into the plains below. The
 mountains and hills are now piles of
 rugged rocks, and the adjacent
 plains are deserts of shifting sands.
 In summer the streams dwindle to
 threads or go dry and in winter and
 spring there is no spongy soil to
 hold back the water and floods pour
 over the far lowlands with disas-
 trous results.

Are we wiser than the China-
 men?
 With all our boasted knowledge
 we are doing today just what the
 benighted Chinamen did centuries
 ago. Our timber is almost gone,
 our hills are washing away, and in
 summer we suffer from disastrous
 droughts and our streams dwindle
 to almost nothing. In some sections
 of the South hills may be seen al-
 most as badly gullied as those of
 China. Even here in Baltimore
 county the best soil of our farms
 has been carried down into our tid-
 al rivers until mud flats and goose
 pastures stand where once ships
 loaded for Europe. We have clear-
 ed off steep hillsides, where nothing
 but trees ought to grow, and in
 many cases we have allowed level
 or rolling lands to grow up with
 bushes and weeds. Droughts are
 becoming alarmingly frequent and
 already our productivity is getting
 down close to our consumption. At
 this rate we will soon be unable to
 send relief to starving Chinamen.
 The country that conserves its
 forests will own the earth.—Town-
