Short Crop of Cow Peas



Prices are going up. The enormous
 demand for Cow Peas last year carried
 the price very high, and as the crop is
 very short and the acreage is rapidly ex-
 tending, there are many indications
 which point to much higher prices as the
 sowing season approaches.

WHIP-POOR-WILL COW PEAS.
 The Whip-poor-wills are generally pre-
 ferred in the Central and Southern
 States. They are bush form, early ma-
 turing and especially desirable for Peas.

NEW ERA COW PEAS.
 New Era's are a little earlier, and make
 more vine than the Whip-poor-wills.

**WONDERFULS, CLAYS AND MIXED
 COW PEAS.**
 For Hay, the Wonderfuls or Mixed
 Cow Peas are more productive, they
 should always be planted with an occa-
 sional grain of Corn, Sorghum Seed,



 3,125,713,600 bushels of last year's
 bumper crop. At the National Corn
 Show just held at Columbus, Ohio,
 this gentleman was awarded the
 \$1000 W. K. Kellogg National Corn
 Trophy, donated in 1909 by Kellogg,
 president of the Kellogg Toasted
 Corn Flake Co., of Battle Creek,
 Mich.

The ear of corn grown by Mr.

 variety. It is 10 inches long, 7 1/2
 inches in circumference, and has
 20 rows of kernels, 6 to the inch in

 width. It is indeed a very correct
 type of yellow dent corn.

Peas in Succession.

Peas in succession may be had in
 two ways: First, by planting the
 early kinds in installments from one
 to two weeks apart until probably
 three plantings are made; second,
 by selecting sorts that mature from
 a week to ten days apart and plant-
 ing them on the same day. For in-
 stance, plant on the same day Alaska,
 Lighting Express and American
 Wonder—in different parts of the
 garden, if you raise your own seed.
