COMMUNICATED.

Baltimore, Md., May 1, 1911.

The "Willie" Domes' case which has become perennial is slated for another—the fifth—trial in the near future. It will be recalled that a shortage of \$67,000 was discovered in the City Register's office two years ago and Domes was the suspect, though the State's Attorney with four successive juries of "twelve tried men and true" has failed to convict him of the theft. To many these mistrials are regarded as a joke—a rather expensive one, however, as the amount of the delinquency is a ready equal to date by the costs of the numerous trials. "It is devoutly to be wished that there will be no realization of the cartoon of our most august luminary whose auroa-billiancy has become a little befogged since the recent primary election; in other words a partial eclipse has somewhat obscured her horizon. In this caricature, which was dated A. D. 1906, Domes is pictured as a very old man with a flowing white beard, and is then still being tried of the alleged offense.

Baltimore is going forward by leaps and bounds; the population is rapidly increasing and overflowing her boundary lines on nearly every side. The city directory for 1911, just from the press gives an estimate, though fairly accurate population of 700,000. This includes a goodly number of persons who reside beyond the city limits for various reasons, such as, lower county taxes, suburban freedom from the close confines of urban life, etc., but whose avocations in the city make them, at least, a "day time" resident.

When Baltimore increases her area to even equal that of some aggressive little cities, whose population is far less, and annexes the eastern, western and southern suburban towns, as will probably soon be done, then the city will contain approximately 750,000, or three quarters of a million souls.

The Emerson Tower building is about completed save a few finishing touches, and the installation of the immense and wonderful clock tower of which it is to be 350 feet high. With this structure erected and the magnificent new Emerson Hotel completed, adding to the many other large edifices that have been built on this thoroughfare since the great fire, old Baltimore Street as it appeared antedating the fire, will be but a fading memory, and an entirely new sky line will appear.


