WASHINGTON LETTER.

Washington, D. C., May 4, 1911.

Dorsey W. Shackelford of Missouri, a member of the Ways and Means committee of the House, has prepared one of the most illuminating letters on the subject of reciprocity that has appeared. The document has caused much discussion among members of Congress and is to be widely circulated.

"The lumber trust and the paper trust are waging a fierce fight against reciprocity," says Mr. Shackelford. "They are making desperate efforts to get the farmers to join them. Wherever possible they have enlisted the papers which circulate among the farmers. They try to make the farmers believe that, by reason of the tariff, he gets more than the fair market price for his products.

"Canada has a tariff which operates against our products sold in Canada. We have a tariff which operates against Canadian products sold here. Reciprocity is an agreement between the two countries to modify both tariffs with a view to more extended trade. A large trade has grown up between us and Canada. In five years ending June 30, in goods of all kinds.

We sold in Canada, \$886,417,376.
Canada sold to us, 393,913,673.

Difference in our favor, \$492,503,703.

"Any country which buys from us more than it sells to us is a good country to trade with. No tariff wall should stand between us and such a country.

"Government statistics for the five years ending June 30 also show these things:

HORSES.

We sold in Canada, \$14,172,975.
Canada sold to us, 2,549,201.

Difference in our favor, \$11,623,774.

CATTLE.

We sold in Canada, \$1,578,179.
Canada sold to us, 1,193,796.

Difference in our favor, \$384,383.

MEAT AND DAIRY.

We sold in Canada, \$17,011,017.
Canada sold to us, 904,191.

Difference in our favor, \$16,106,826.

BREADSTUFFS.

We sold in Canada, \$31,506,556.
Canada sold to us, 6,679,884.

Difference in our favor, \$24,826,672.

"You ask why Canada favors reciprocity if it is to give us the best of it on these products. The answer is easy.

First, the Canadian tariff is added to the price which the Canadian consumer must pay. Canada desires to relieve her people from this extra price.

"Second, Canada is willing to take her tariff off of the goods which we sell her if in turn we will take our tariff off of the paper, wood pulp and lumber which she sells us. If our tariff against these products were removed she would sell us a still larger amount of timber products than she now sells us. How could that hurt the American farmer?

"Who, then, would be hurt by reciprocity? I will tell you. The lumber trust and the paper trust. Reciprocity would bring Canadian lumber and paper here to be sold in competition with the American lumber and paper. This would give the American people cheaper paper, and the farmer cheaper lumber to build houses and barns. So you see why it is the trusts are making such frantic efforts to defeat reciprocity. They desire to hold a monopoly of the American lumber and paper markets. Let the farmer of good cheer. He is not the fellow who will be hit by reciprocity. He will be helped. The lumber trust and the paper trust are the ones who will feel the weight of this measure."

TAFT FIGHTS PROGRESSIVES.

President Taft is still fighting progressive republicans. He first endeavored to another progressiveism by refusing patronage to members of Congress who would not vote for bills recommended by him whether they thought them to be for the public good or not. This movement failed utterly. Insurgency increased instead of disappearing. Then the President used all the influences at his command to bring about the defeat of Senator La Follette who was re-elected by a large vote. Now the President is taking the leading part in the fight against giving the progressives of the senate the committee places they demand. Inasmuch as the President's former efforts caused two progressives to grow where but one had grown before, the progressives can afford to be patient.

RECIPROCALITY ACT IMPROVED.

Practically the only change made in the Canadian reciprocity agreement by the Democrats in the House was the addition of a clause authorizing the President, by executive act, to reduce the tariff of this country, on any item, whether included in the treaty or not, whenever Canada is willing to put them on her free list. In other words we express a willingness to move toward free trade with Canada as fast as Canada may desire. This invitation applies only

to Canada, however, and the object is the promotion of the friendliest possible commercial intercourse between the United States and our neighbor on the north.

INCOME TAX IS CLOSE.

The income tax amendment to the constitution, which was a plank in the last democratic national platform, has now been ratified by thirty states. To insure its acceptance thirty-five states are necessary. Only four states—Louisiana, New Hampshire, Rhode Island and West Virginia—have declared themselves in the negative. This leaves twelve states from which to secure the necessary five votes to make the amendment a part of the constitution. An income tax is practically assured.

The bill states:

Peckham was in her lifetime indebted unto the plaintiff First National Bank, on a judgment in sum of \$1,128 with interest from September 18, 1908 as represented by copy of said judgments filed in the above cause, and to the plaintiff Lillian M. Lynch, on a judgment in the sum of \$307.29, with interest from April 28, 1904, as represented by copy of judgment filed in the above cause, and \$8.05 costs.

2 That the said Kathleen M. Peckham being indebted unto the plaintiffs and having real estate in fee simple of value, died during the year 1908, intestate, leaving her husband, Frederick W. H. Peckham and two children known to plaintiffs as her heirs at law, viz: Frederick W. H. Peckham, Jr., and Mary C. Peckham, both of whom are infants, under the age of twenty-one years.

3 That said defendants are non-residents of the State of Maryland.

4 That the real estate in Saint Mary's County of which the said Kathleen M. Peckham died seized and possessed, was conveyed to her by a deed from Giles F. Dyer recorded in Liber E. B. A. No. 3, folio 189, one of the Land Records of said County, and that under a proper construction of this deed the said Kathleen M. Peckham was entitled to a fee simple estate in the land in said deed mentioned.

5 That no letters of administration have ever been granted upon the estate of the said Kathleen M. Peckham and that said deceased left no personal estate sufficient to pay all the just debts due and owing by her at the time of her death and that plaintiffs and all other creditors of the said Kathleen M.
