OLD CHARLOTTE HALL.

(Reported for the Beacon.)

The 115th year of active work by this historic institution was brought to a close on June 15th, with more than ordinary brightness.

The final examinations of a week were concluded June 10. Sunday evening following a very eloquent sermon was preached to the graduating class, in the Chapel, by the Rev. T. Hubert Jones, of Charles county. He is a gifted orator and highly esteemed by all who know him.

Monday evening, June 12 the Y. M. C. A. held its farewell meeting. An interesting program was rendered by the student members, with addresses by the Rev. T. Wilson Jarboe, of Frederick county; Mr. Morrison, the interim Secretary, and by Mr. Harding, chairman of the executive committee, both of Washington.

Tuesday evening, the W. & S. Society had its annual celebration in the school hall before a large and appreciative audience. The subject for debate—"Resolved, that capital punishment should be abolished"—was well contested by J. S. Gough and J. H. Withgott, for the affirmative; W. C. Paradee and A. P. Gough for the negative. The decision was in favor of the affirmative. J. S. Gough was awarded a gold medal as the best debater, and W. C. Paradee received honorable mention as coming second. The invited orator of the occasion was John H. Thomas Briscoe, of St. Mary's Co., whose excellent address was delivered in masterly style.

Wednesday afternoon a competitive company drill, with dress parade and review, was witnessed by many spectators. Col. Harry M. Hutton, assistant Adjutant-General of Maryland, inspected the drill, and decided in favor of Co. "A," whose Captain, J. S. Gough, was awarded a handsome sword as a prize gift from the commandant, Capt. S. W. Anderson. Colonel Hutton was accompanied by his charming wife.

The evening of the same day, the prize elocutionary contest was held, 16 boys competing for the medal, which was awarded to D. McComas French, Frank Steil being rated second, and D. K. Waters, third.

The commencement on Thursday was highly creditable. The graduates were: J. S. Gough, salutatorian; P. B. Shipley, valedictorian; W. C. Paradee and J. H. Withgott, James Walter Thomas, Esq., of Cumberland, was the invited orator. His address was a model of elocution and eloquent English and graphic style and we regret that it was not in writing, so it could be published, for it was a valuable contribution to the history of the State.

After the Commencement Exercises, the Alumni banquet was served in the gymnasium to 82 loyal sons of the school, who came from far and near, testifying their loyalty and devotion to their old Alma Mater. Gen. L. A. Wilmer was the Chief Speaker. He gave an interesting account of the history of the school. Many other excellent speeches were made, too numerous to mention in detail.

The Annual Students Ball, Thursday evening was well attended and the delightful strains of Steinwald's Music prolonged festivities to broad daylight.

\$300,000 Series "B" 4 percent State Insane Hospital Loan.

The undersigned, Governor, Comptroller and Treasurer of the State of Maryland, in pursuance of Chapter 250 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1910, will receive proposals for \$300,000 4 per cent State Insane Hospital Loan, Series "B".

The above Series "B" of the State Insane Hospital Loan will be dated July 1st, 1911 bear interest from that date at the rate of four per centum per annum, payable semi-annually on the first days of January and July in each and every year and the principal will be redeemable at the pleasure of the State after the first day of July in the year 1921 and the whole debt will be payable on the first day of July, 1926. The debt is exempt from State, County and Municipal taxation and will be issued in bond form with coupons attached.

Said proposals must be delivered, sealed, to the Treasurer of the State at Annapolis on or before 12 o'clock noon, of the first day of July, 1911 and have endorsed on the back of the envelope "Proposals for the State Insane Hospital Loan." Each bid must be accompanied by a certified check on some responsible banking institution for five per cent of the amount of such bid and the same will be opened in the office of the State Treasurer in the City of Annapolis at 12 o'clock noon, July 1st, 1911, in the presence of the undersigned.

On the opening of such proposals so many of said coupon bonds have been bid for, not exceeding, however, the amount for which proposals are invited, may be awarded by said Governor, Comptroller and Treasurer and Treasurer, or a majority of them, to the highest responsible bidder or bidders for cash; and when two or more bidders have made the same bid, which bids are the highest, and if the amounts so bid for by the highest responsible bidders are in excess of the whole amount of the said bonds so offered for sale, then such bonds may be awarded to such highest responsible bidder bidding the same price in the proportion which the amount each has bid for bears to the whole amount of said bonds so offered for sale.

These bonds will be issued in the denomination of \$1000 and subject to registration as to principal. The right is reserved to reject any and all bids.
