## The Political Situation.

The Baltimore Telegram of June 24th, is responsible for the statement that the Republican State leaders have definitely determined to nominate no local candidates either for the Legislature or for county offices in the Wilson Law counties at this Fall's election. "Bobtail" tickets will be put up wherever the Democrats are sure of carrying a county and the whole Republican forces will concentrate upon the gubernatorial candidate.

"By this plan the Republican leaders hope to carry the State for Governor this Fall and will leave no stone unturned to bring about this result. If they can elect the Governor, they conceive that they will have a "cinch" on the United States Senatorship for young "Bill" Jackson in 1913 and Mr. Jackson is backing Phillips Lee Goldsborough for Governor so that Mr. Goldsborough, if elected, may republish the Boards of Elections Supervisors, and through them nullify the Wilson Ballot Law. The Republicans think the nullification of this law would give them a chance of carrying the Legislature of 1913."

The Republican leaders are astute politicians and real bosses; they meet in a room in the Renort, select the candidates for Governor, Comptroller, Attorney-General and also state who shall not run on the Republican ticket in St. Mary's, if the statement of a Republican candidate for office here is correct. Yet there is never a complaint in the Baltimore dailies about Republican bossism. They go ahead, fix up states, regardless of the will of the voters, and never a word of protest is heard.

## State and City Politics.

(From the Democratic Telegram.)

State Senator Gorman still maintains his position as the strongest man yet spoken of but has not definitely placed himself in the fight nor has he said authoritatively that he is a candidate. Until he, himself makes such a statement there will be no certainty about it. All that is certain at the present time is that there is more sentiment behind him among Democrats of the rank and file than behind any other individual who has been discussed in connection with the nomination.

Within the past few days, there has been a good deal more talk concerning Judge N. Charles Burke. By many, Judge Burke is considered as the ideal compromise candidate and it is said that no element of the party would balk at his selection. Even the Progressive Democratic Association—that new organization that seems to have gotten itself established for the purpose of opposing organization candidates—could say against Judge Burke. There is no question but that Judge Burke would be elected by an almost unprecedented majority if he were nominated and those close to him are responsible for the statement that he desires the nomination.

Hon. Blair Lee, State Senator from Montgomery County, who has announced himself as candidate for the nomination for Governor, has opened quarters on the Fifth Floor of the Union Trust Building, where Mr. Buck is in charge. Things are beginning to hum about Senator Lee's office, and he evidently proposes to surmount all obstacles in his ambition to attain the highest political position Maryland has to bestow. Senator Lee is a popular subject for conversation among his constituents; and his friends call attention, with pardonable pride, to his work in the Legislature, which is one of the monuments to his capability for the Governorship. It is claimed he can produce the longest list of Legislation favorable to the general community, which was proposed through his efforts and passed. This is a challenge, and the Senator does not hesitate one moment in giving it public voice. It is also claimed that nearly the entire section of Western Maryland is favorable to his candidacy; that Baltimore, Anne Arundel, Montgomery and other Counties stand ready to give their earnest support during the campaign. Several prominent members of the Democratic Progressive Association have given assurance in Senator Lee's fight. Altogether Senator Lee has a promising outlook.
