Hon. William B. Claggett, State Comptroller died on Monday of last week. For many years he was the Democratic leader in Prince George's county. He served two terms in the Maryland Senate and was appointed Comptroller by Governor Crothers to fill the vacancy when Dr. J. W. Hering was appointed as a member of the Public Service Commission.

Governor Crothers.
Gov. Crothers has officially announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for Governor and appeals to the people upon his record. In his announcement he favors:

- Tax rate revision.
- Home rule for Baltimore.
- Increased Baltimore representation in Legislature.
- Popular election of United States Senators.

- New city charter for Baltimore.
- Natural gas.
- Cheaper gas and electricity.
- New State's roads loan, with \$2,500,000 for streets of Baltimore.
- Convict labor on State roads.
- Abolition of needless offices.
- Employers' liability act.
- State school of technology in Baltimore.
- Reform of magistracy system.
- Increase in public school teachers' salaries.
- Oyster legislation looking to State aid in developing the industry.
- Amendment of corrupt practices act.

Senator Gorman.
On Tuesday, of last week, Senator A. P. Gorman, formally announced his candidacy for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination. Senator Gorman's announcement was as follows:

"To the Democratic Voters of Maryland:
"In response to what I conceive to be a demand on the part of a large number of Democrats in all parts of the State, and after mature deliberation as to my duty, I have concluded to become a candidate for the nomination for Governor in the Democratic primaries to be held on August 29 next.
"I shall issue a statement shortly on my position on various public questions.

Mr. Gorman favors:
A clean, conservative and business administration.
To favor a legalized primary which gives to everyone, regardless of his pecuniary condition, an opportunity of becoming a candidate and enabling the people freely and fully to express their choice.

Hearty sympathy with the idea of regulation of corporations rendering public service, both as a protection to the corporation and to the individual.
A more liberal policy toward the public schools and better pay for teachers.
The conservation of the natural resources of the State.
Amendment of the tax laws so as to relieve taxpayers who have unjust burdens.
Increased representation in the Legislature for Baltimore city.
The improvement of State roads.

DEMOCRAT OPPOSES TAFT CENSORSHIP
An important measure pending before Congress is House Resolution No. 9970, introduced by Congressman James T. Lloyd of Missouri.

The measure is aimed particularly at the action of the Taft administration in prohibiting postal employees from organizing, and the still more remarkable Taft policy of denying civil service employees the right to petition Congress, or even to give members of Congress information until it has first been censored by their superiors.
The Constitution guarantees to every citizen of the United States the right to petition Congress.
The Lloyd resolution occupies the novel role, therefore, of having for its purpose the restoration to government employees of rights they are entitled to under the Constitution, but which rights have been taken away by the President in the desperate effort to prevent a further leakage of information injurious to the Republican party such as occurred in the Ballenger case.

There are now three announced candidates for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination: Senator Blair Leo, of Montgomery county; Governor Austin L. Crothers, of Cecil county, and Senator Arthur P. Gorman, of Howard county.
Present indications are that Hon. Phillips Lee Goldsborough will have no opposition for the Republican nomination.

Notice to Candidates.

The governing bodies of the Democratic and Republican parties having fixed Tuesday, August 29th, 1911, as the date for holding Primary Elections, the attention of all whom it may concern is called to the following provision of Section 1000, Chapter 741, Acts of 1910.
"Said several Boards of Supervisors of Elections shall print or cause to be printed on said official ballots the names of all candidates for office to be voted for, and for delegates to any convention, or for party executive officers, or for membership of any executive committee or managing body of any political party, who shall become duly qualified by the name of the amount herein named, when any payment is herein required, and shall have filed a certificate in writing with the Board of Supervisors of Elections in Baltimore city or in any of the counties, as the case may be, containing the name of the person seeking nomination for office or to be a delegate to a convention, or an executive officer or member of an executive committee or managing body of a political party, his residence place where he is a registered voter, his address, the office or position for which he seeks to be nominated or elected, and the party to which he belongs, and duly acknowledged by the person filing such certificate for such nomination or selection before an officer duly authorized to take acknowledgments, shall append a certificate of such acknowledgment to the certificate to be filed by a candidate seeking to be elected as a delegate to the convention shall, moreover, specify the convention to which he seeks to be elected. All such certificates must be filed and payments made not less than fifteen days before the day of said primary election."
"Each candidate for nomination for public office at a primary election shall pay the sum of twenty five dollars (\$25) for each county or legislative district of Baltimore city in which his name appears upon the ballot, provided that in any county where the salary of the office for which nomination is sought is three hundred dollars (\$300) or less, such payment shall be ten dollars (\$10), and if a candidate for Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller, or Clerk of the Court of Appeals of the State, then he shall pay the sum of ten dollars (\$10) for each county or legislative district of Baltimore city, upon filing his respective certificate with the Board of Supervisors of Elections."
"The candidates for nomination for State offices shall make payment and file certificate of candidacy not less than 20 days prior to the date of Primary Elections."
