Dr. Johnson determining that death was due to heart disease. George Green was one of the most worthy and thrifty colored men in St. Mary's and was respected and esteemed by all who knew him. He is survived by his wife, who was a daughter of the late Richard Winters, of Choptico, in his day, one of the leading colored men in Southern Maryland.

John Clifford Doyle and Mary G. Vallandigham were married at St. Aloysius Church, Leonardtown, last Monday, Rev. W. J. Stanton, S. J., officiating. We wish the young couple great happiness and prosperity. Mrs. P. B. Bowen, of Baltimore, is visiting her father, Joseph H. Sunday morning last, Silvester Kelly, 11-year-old son of Alfred Kelly, colored, of Patuxent district, shot and killed his three-year-old sister, Margaret R. Kelly. Four children were left at home and the youngest got the gun and was playing with it when it was accidentally discharged, the load striking the leg of a table. The oldest boy, fearing his father's displeasure, took the gun and put in another cartridge and was putting the gun back in place when it was again discharged, this time killing the little girl. Justice Jos. C. Wible was informed of the death and summoned a coronor's jury as follows: Caleb Dean, A. L. Dean, G. W. Dean, R. A. Clarke, C. A. Thompson, J. P. Tippet, Geo. A. Clarke, R. Stevens, Alex. Stevens, B. Baskins, H. Bennett, F. Stevens, the six last named being colored. The evidence was substantially as above given and the jury found that the killing was accidental.

PROCLAMATION

Publication of Proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Whereas, At the January Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, held in the year of our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and Six, the Acts were passed, one proposing an Amendment to Section 1 of the Constitution, and another proposing an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution, by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 8; one proposing an Amendment to Section 3 of said Constitution, and one proposing an Amendment to Section 4 of said Constitution, said Acts being respectively Chapters 208, 209 and 210 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1906, and which are in the words following, to-wit:

CHAPTER 208.
An Act to propose an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of this State by adding thereto a new Section, to be known as Section 8, to follow Section 7 and to provide for the submission of said Amendment to the qualified voters of this State for adoption or rejection.

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of all members of each of the two Houses concurring, that the following section be and the same is hereby proposed as an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution of this State, which said section, if adopted by the qualified voters of this State, shall be known as Section 8, to follow Section 7, of said Article.

Section 2. All State and municipal elections shall be conducted by the system commonly known as the Australian Ballot System, and it shall be the duty of the General Assembly to provide by law for a form of ballot, uniform throughout the State, for use at all elections in this State, and provide that on said ballot after the name of each candidate thereon who may have been duly nominated as the candidate of any political party or organization, shall be printed the legal name of said party or organization; and equal representation of the minority party among the judges and clerks of election returns or officers performing similar functions shall not be abolished by the General Assembly unless by a vote of four-fifths of all the members of each House.

Section 3. Every male white citizen not disqualified by the Constitution of this State, and provide that on said ballot after the name of each candidate thereon who may have been duly nominated as the candidate of any political party or organization, shall be printed the legal name of said party or organization; and equal representation of the minority party among the judges and clerks of election returns or officers performing similar functions shall not be abolished by the General Assembly unless by a vote of four-fifths of all the members of each House.

Section 4. Every male citizen not disqualified by the Second or Third Section of this Article possessing the qualifications as to age and residence mentioned in said Article, who at the time of his application for registration is the bona fide owner of real or personal property, or both, in an amount of not less than five hundred dollars, is assessed thereon for the tax levied on the City and County of Baltimore or of one of the Counties of this State, has been such owner and so assessed for two years next preceding his application for registration, shall have paid and shall produce receipts for the taxes so assessed for said two years, and shall at the time of his application make affidavit before the officers of registration that he is the bona fide owner of the property so assessed to him and that he has been such owner for two years next preceding his application.

Section 5. If any person other than those herein mentioned shall be or become legally entitled to be registered as voters at State Elections in this State, then this section shall be null and void and the General Assembly shall provide by law for the same, as if this section had never been adopted, and the laws of this State, including the local laws applicable to certain counties heretofore relating to the form of ballot to be used at elections, in force on the first day of July in the year nineteen hundred and ten, shall revive or continue in force until altered by the General Assembly notwithstanding any Acts to the contrary which may have been passed while the terms of this section shall have been in force or until the General Assembly shall have repealed or amended the provisions of this section to be valid.

Section 6. And be it further enacted, by the authority aforesaid, that the aforesaid section hereby proposed as an Amendment to the Constitution shall be at the next General Election held in this State, submitted to the legal and qualified voters thereof for their adoption or rejection, in pursuance of the directions contained in Article 14 of the Constitution of this State, and at said General Election the vote on the said proposed Amendment to the Constitution shall be by ballot, and upon each ballot shall be printed the words "For Constitutional Amendment" and "Against Constitutional Amendment," as now provided by law, and immediately after said section shall be made to the Governor of the vote for and against said proposed Amendment, as directed by said Fourteenth Article of the Constitution.
