

PROCLAMATION

Publication of Proposed Constitution- al Amendments.

Whereas, At the January Session of the
 General Assembly of Maryland, held in the
 year of our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and
 Ten, three Acts were passed, one proposing
 an Amendment to Article 1 of the Con-
 stitution, by adding thereto a Section to
 be known as Section 1, one proposing an
 Amendment to Section 1 of Article 2 of said
 Constitution, and one proposing an Amend-
 ment to Section 4 of Article 3 of said Con-
 stitution, said Acts being respectively
 Chapter 201, 202 and 203 of the Acts of the
 General Assembly of Maryland of 1910,
 and which are in the words following, to-
 wit:

CHAPTER 201.
 An Act to propose an Amendment to
 Article 1 of the Constitution of this State
 by adding thereto a new Section to be
 known as Section 1, to follow Section 7
 and to provide for the submission of said
 Amendment to the qualified voters of this
 State for adoption or rejection.
 Section 1. Be it enacted by the Gen-
 eral Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of
 all members of each of the two Houses
 concurring, that the following section be
 and the same is hereby proposed as an
 Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitu-
 tion of this State, which said section, if adopted
 by the qualified voters of this State, shall
 stand as an additional section to said Ar-
 ticle 1, to be known as Section 1, to follow
 Section 7, of said Article.

CHAPTER 202.
 An Act to propose an Amendment to
 Section 1 of the Constitution of this State
 by adding thereto a new Section to be
 known as Section 2, to follow Section 1
 and to provide for the submission of said
 Amendment to the qualified voters of this
 State for adoption or rejection.
 Section 1. Be it enacted by the Gen-
 eral Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of
 all members of each of the two Houses
 concurring, that the following section be
 and the same is hereby proposed as an
 Amendment to Section 1 of the Constitu-
 tion of this State, which said section, if adopted
 by the qualified voters of this State, shall
 stand as an additional section to said Ar-
 ticle 1, to be known as Section 2, to follow
 Section 1, of said Article.

CHAPTER 203.
 An Act to amend Section 4 of Article 3,
 of the Constitution of this State, and to provide
 for the submission of the proposed Amend-
 ment to the qualified voters of this State for
 adoption or rejection.
 Section 1. Be it enacted by the Gen-
 eral Assembly of Maryland, three-fifths of
 all members of each of the two Houses
 concurring, that the following section be
 and the same is hereby proposed as an
 Amendment to Section 4 of Article 3 of the
 Constitution of this State, which said section,
 if adopted by the qualified voters of this
 State, shall stand in the place and instead
 of the section now contained in said Article
 3 of the Constitution of this State, to-
 wit:

Section 4. All State and municipal elec-
 tions shall be conducted by the system
 commonly known as the Australian Ballot
 System, and it shall be the duty of the
 General Assembly to provide by law for
 a form of ballot, uniform throughout the
 State, for use at all State elections in
 this State, and provide that on said bal-
 lot after the name of the candidate
 person who may have been duly nominated
 as the candidate of any political party or
 organization, there shall be printed the
 legal name of said party or organization;
 and the name of the candidate shall be
 equal representation of the members of
 among the judges and clerks of election
 registers or other officers performing simi-
 lar functions shall not be abolished by
 the General Assembly, unless by a vote of four-
 fifths of all the members of each House
 of the General Assembly.

The right to be registered as a qual-
 ified voter and the right to vote at any
 State or municipal election in this State
 shall be limited to the following persons:
 First: Every male white citizen not
 disqualified by the Second or Third Sec-
 tions of this Article, possessing the qual-
 ifications as to age and residence mentioned
 in Section 1 of this Article.
 Second: Every other male citizen not
 disqualified by the Second or Third Sec-
 tions of this Article possessing the qual-
 ifications as to age and residence mentioned
 in Section 1 of this Article, who at the
 time of his application for registration is
 the bona fide owner of real or personal
 property, or both, in an amount of not less
 than one hundred dollars, as assessed there-
 on for the tax books of the City of Bal-
 timore or of one of the Counties of this
 State, has been such owner and so assessed
 for two years immediately preceding his ap-
 plication for registration, and such prop-
 erty shall produce receipts for the taxes on
 said property for said two years, and shall
 at the time of his application make affirma-
 tion under oath that he is the bona fide
 owner of the property, and that he has been
 such owner for two years next preceding his
 application.
 If any person other than those herein
 mentioned shall be or become legally en-
 titled to be registered as voters at State
 Elections in this State, then this section
 shall be null and void and the General
 Assembly shall have the same powers
 as if this section had never been adopted,
 and the laws of this State, including the
 local laws applicable to certain counties
 heretofore relating to the mode of being
 entered on the rolls of voters, shall be in
 force on the first day of July in the year
 nineteen hundred and ten, shall revive or
 continue in force until altered by the
 General Assembly notwithstanding any
 Act to the contrary which may have been
 passed while the terms of this section
 shall have been in force or while the
 General Assembly shall have been in force
 or assumed the provisions of this section
 shall be in force.

Section 2. And be it further enacted,
 by the authority aforesaid, that the afore-
 said section hereby proposed as an Amend-
 ment to Section 1 of the Constitution shall
 be submitted to the legal and qualified voters
 thereof for their adoption or rejection, in
 pursuance of the directions contained in
 Article 1 of the Constitution of this State,
 and at said General Election the vote on
 the said proposed Amendment to the Con-
 stitution shall be by ballot, and upon each
 ballot shall be printed the words, "For
 the Constitutional Amendment" and "Against
 the Constitutional Amendment" as now pro-
 vided by law, and immediately after said
 election due returns shall be made to the
 Governor of the vote for and against said
 proposed Amendment, as directed by said
 Fourteenth Article of the Constitution.

Now, Therefore, I Austin L. Crothers,
 Governor of the State of Maryland, in pur-
 suance of the provisions of Section 1 of

 each of said Acts proposing said Amend-
 ments be published in at least two news-
 papers in each of the counties of the State,
 where no newspaper may be published, in any
 county where not more than one newspaper
 is published, then in that newspaper,
 and in three newspapers published in the
 City of Baltimore, one of which shall be
 in the German language, one week prior
 to at least three months preceding the elec-
 tion of 1911, at which said election said
 proposed amendments shall be submitted
 to the legal and qualified voters of the
 State, for their adoption or rejection.

 State of Maryland,
 Done at the City of
 Annapolis, this 7th
 day of July, in the
 year of our Lord, one
 thousand nine hundred
 and eleven.
