A convention of the National Slavonic Society began in Baltimore last Monday and will continue until next Sunday. The convention was opened by prayer by Rev. Father Fletcher, of the Cathedral, who presented the Cardinal. Dr. Fletcher made a short address in which he referred to St. Mary's City as the cradle of liberty and spoke of the colony to be established there by the Society. Mayor Preston also made an address. It will be remembered that the Slavonic Society has purchased about 2,800 acres about the site of the old St. Mary's City which is to be occupied by Slav settlers. A home for the aged and an orphan asylum is to be erected on the property. One of the features of the Convention is an excursion of the 250 delegates to St. Mary's City for a view of their future colony. The Supreme officers of the Society are expected to remove to St. Mary's within a year and begin work on the property. It is said there are many applications for farms by prospective settlers.

Wealthiest Town in U. S.
 Reedville, situated on the Great Wicomico river, in the lower part of Northumberland county, Va., is the center of the great menhaden industry, which has made the town, with a population of 159 within a radius of three miles, the wealthiest per capita in the United States. This one industry has done more toward the material development of Northumberland than all the other interests combined, giving employment to hundreds of persons at remunerative salaries.

According to statistics furnished by one of the leading fish factories of Reedville, there are 25 fully equipped fishing steamers. The steamers use 700 tons of salt annually for salting nets, and there are \$40,000 worth of nets used annually. Modernly equipped factories have taken the place of the pioneer structures, with the most costly and improved machinery, and the very best facilities are employed in the handling of the products of these manufacturing. The seven factories are valued at \$350,000 and employ 500 men, whose pay is \$35 per month and board. The total expense of the factories for the season of six months is estimated at \$250,000.

The number of fish utilized in 1911 was 250,000,000. On the basis of last season's catch, there will be 28,000 tons dry fish scraps and 17,000 pounds fish oil made this season.

The 1911 season opened under the most favorable conditions and promises to be the best in the history of the industry. Large catches of menhaden have been made.—Exchange.

Mr. Dawkins removed to Baltimore later and after practicing here a few years went to Chattanooga, Tenn. In 1887 he returned to Baltimore, where he has built up a large practice.
