

PROCLAMATION

Publication of Proposed Constitutional Amendments.

Whereas, At the January Session of the General Assembly of Maryland, held in the year of our Lord, Nineteen Hundred and Ten, three Acts were passed, one proposing an Amendment to Article 1 of the Constitution, by adding thereto a Section to be known as Section 21, one proposing an Amendment to Section 2 of Article 3 of said Constitution, and one proposing an Amendment to Section 4 of Article 3 of said Constitution, and the other proposing respectively Chapters 22, 23 and 24 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1910, and which are in the words following, to wit:

CHAPTER 22.

An Act to amend Section 4 of Article 3 of the Constitution of this State, to be known as Section 4, to follow Section 7 of the Constitution of this State.

Section 4. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, that the following shall be the Constitution of this State, to be known as Section 4, to follow Section 7 of the Constitution of this State:

Section 1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, that the following shall be the Constitution of this State, to be known as Section 1, to follow Section 4 of the Constitution of this State:

Section 2. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, that the following shall be the Constitution of this State, to be known as Section 2, to follow Section 1 of the Constitution of this State:

each county of the State, shall be entitled to one Senator, to be elected by the qualified voters of said county, and the number of Senators shall be equal to the number of the counties of the State, respectively, and Baltimore City shall be entitled to one additional Senator, who shall be elected at large, by the qualified voters of the City, and all of said Senators shall serve for four years from the date of their election, subject to the classification of Senators hereinafter provided for.
