DEMOCRATS, ATTENTION!

A meeting of the Democratic State Central Committee held in Baltimore, Friday, August 14th, the following resolution regarding the all important subject of registration was adopted:

Resolved, That, in view of the fact that a new registration of voters will be held throughout the State, including Baltimore City, the members of this Committee, in their respective counties and legislative districts of Baltimore City, are instructed to proceed at once to the preparation of plans and details to secure the registration of every Democratic qualified voter in the State and to prevent the erroneous and fraudulent registration of persons not qualified to vote.

The registration days are: In Baltimore City—Tuesday, Sept. 22, Wednesday, 23rd, Tuesday, Oct. 6, Wednesday, October 7, and Saturday October 10, with Tuesday, October 13, for revision only.

In the Counties—Tuesday, Sept. 22, Wednesday, 23rd, Tuesday, Oct. 6, Wednesday 7, with Tuesday, October 13, for revision only.

Resolved, Further that the attention of the Democratic voters of this State is called to a very important and unusual phase of the situation. Great as is the importance of completing the Democratic registration for the election of a Democratic United States Senator, six Democratic members of the House of Representatives and a Democratic Associate Judge in the Third District, this is not the full extent of our responsibility and duty to the Democratic party this year in the work of registration. It should be brought home to the Democratic voters that unless their names are placed upon the books this year, they will not be entitled to vote in the Primary Election next year, when State Officers and County Officers are to be nominated, excepting in Dorchester county where there will be a day for registration just prior to next year's primaries. In the remainder of the State there will be no such opportunity.
