The visitors were blanked in the following four innings, but in the ninth accounted for two more runs on two hits and an error by Davis at third.

The home boys managed to secure a hit in the first and third innings, but were never in danger of scoring. In the fifth Roberts went to first on an error by the centerfielder but was thrown out at second on B. Camalier's grounder; Camalier being called out on account of Roberts blocking the throw to first base. In the sixth the locals scored their lone run on hits by H. Davis and Ross.
