**Cardinal Blesses
 Cambridge School**

**In Forceful Discourse Dwells On
 the Great Necessity of
 Parochial School.**

**BISHOP FENWICK'S
 WORK FOR EDUCATION.**

His Eminence, the Cardinal, last Sunday blessed the new parochial school in the parish of St. Mary of the Annunciation, Cambridgeport. He also delivered a forceful address on Christian education and the necessity of parochial schools. His Eminence paid a notable tribute to Boston's second Bishop, Rt. Rev. Benedict J. Fenwick, a truly intellectual giant, a man of great mind and fearless courage," as the Cardinal said, who "as a true leader in intelligence, statesmanship, Catholic conviction and Christian fortitude," began the work of Christian training in the diocese with a school in the basement of the Cathedral and accomplished great things in this line, despite unjust opposition and the bigotry of the non-Catholic element.

CARDINAL'S ADDRESS.

At the entrance to the school building His Eminence and the clergy passed between two lines of the Alumni Association. After the Cardinal had blessed the edifice he was escorted to the Church. Here a brief address was delivered by Father Doody, following which His Eminence delivered the following discourse:

Your pastor has told you ably and well the story of the devotion of this parish to the ideals of Christian education, and it is because in good report and evil report you have been faithful to this fundamental principle of Catholic life and duty that I come here today to give to you the honor which is your due—of faithful and sturdy fidelity to the parish school.

In essence it seems strange to single out for special honor any one parish for loyalty to a principle so fundamental and universal in its obligation as this one of Christian education.

It seems singular indeed, now when no Catholic school in the

man great of mind and fearless in courage, in the person of Benedict Fenwick, it was only natural to find the conditions of strange timidity and apologetic reserve bloom out openly into sturdy, sterling and conspicuous evidence of virility and hopefulness.

The Catholics had hitherto been accustomed to lurk timidly in the corner. This was no way either to inspire them with courageous manliness or fearless loyalty, neither was it ever calculated to inspire their hostile neighbors with a salutary respect for their position as Christians or citizens.

THE DIOCESE'S GREATEST BISHOP.

Bishop Fenwick was surely the man, not only for the time, but for all time. He has until the present never received even a small share of the fame and glory absolutely due him as head of this Diocese, as a true leader in intelligence, statesmanship, Catholic conviction and Christian fortitude. To my mind, and I am sure history endorses my position fully and emphatically, he was by great odds, the very ablest and noblest chief this Diocese has ever yet had.

He knew full well that unless his flock took on its measure of self-respect by standing openly and fearlessly for its fundamental principles it could never expect to be either respected or understood by the Puritan enemies who surrounded it with anything but sympathetic barriers.

He realized, great educator as he was, that his people could never expect to be either strong or firm, valiant in the faith, unless in early childhood and all through the years of youth they learned side by side with secular learning the great principles and virtues of Catholic life and action. And so he gave himself heart and soul to the founding and nurturing of Catholic schools, academies and colleges.

With meagre means, but with the spirit of an intelligent and fearless apostleship, he began and carried on his work all his life.

In a few years miracles were wrought. The famous Convent of the Ursulines in Charlestown, the Holy Cross College in Worcester, an academy in Damariscotta, a college with its school in Benedicta,—

decisions of the world in the affairs of eternal salvation. It must form public opinion, not follow it, in those fundamental principles which depend not upon popular pleasure but divine authority.

So, thank God, there was a Fenwick to fearlessly plant here the banner of Christian education—and thank God there were at least a few parishes like this to keep that banner waving.

Fenwick made us pioneers of the great boon of Catholic education, and had there been more with his spirit so well exemplified in the history of the parish, we should have been not pioneers only but leaders of the whole movement throughout the Church in America.

[Bishop Benedict Fenwick was a native of Maryland, born near Leonardtown, in St. Mary's county, the cradle of Catholicity, September 3, 1782, descended from Cuthbert Fenwick, one of the earliest settlers who came with Lord Baltimore. Cardinal O'Connell thinks Bishop Fenwick one of the greatest Bishops this country ever had. Before being made Bishop, he was a prominent Jesuit, and was President of Georgetown College, Washington, D. C. His nearest relatives are the descendants of the late Aloysius Francis and John Felix Fenwick of Leonardtown, St. Mary's county, Md.]

SENSIBLE FEEDS FOR THE BROOD SOW.

Recommended in Experiment Station Bulletin To Progressive Hog Raisers.

When a sow is producing two litters a year there is seldom a time when she is not doing double duty. During the period of gestation she must keep up her own bodily functions and in addition supply the nourishment for the development of the foetal litter. After farrowing the drain upon her system in providing feed for the young pigs, is even greater than during the period of gestation and we should therefore be able to appreciate the necessity of supplying her with the proper amount of suitable rations at all times.

Summer feeding during the period of gestation should consist of good pasture and a variety of concentrated grain rations. For the latter the following mixtures are recommended:

1. Four parts of milk by weight and one part of corn.
2. Five parts corn meal, five parts middlings or ground oats and one part digestant package.
3. Three parts of shorts and corn.
4. Two parts of corn and one part
