**Maryland Foot-and-Mouth Quarantine.**

By an order effective July 5, the quarantine for foot-and-mouth disease of the Baltimore Stock Yards is modified and these yards are now classed as a restricted area for handling live stock for immediate slaughter only, the quarantine regulations in the restricted area being the least severe of any in the entire quarantine area. At the present time these yards, the pens of the Baltimore Butchers' Abattoir Company in the city of Baltimore, and those portions of Baltimore and Frederick counties, which are within 3 miles of the infected premises, are the only portions of Maryland still under quarantine. All of this territory, with the exception of the Abattoir Company's pens, is in the restricted area. The Abattoir Company's pens are in the modified area.


