## REGISTRATION DAYS

On Tuesday, September 28, and Tuesday, October 5, the registration offices of the various districts will be open for the enrollment of voters not already on the books, and unless your name appears upon the books you cannot vote in the coming General Election. To qualify as a voter is a sacred duty that an eligible owes to himself and to the State, and it is a time like this, when so many vital issues confront the electorate, the timely expression of the Six of recent date is most appropriate.

"If a man has no public spirit, pure selfishness ought to make him take a hard line in the game of government, because this game as it is played by the politicians concerns him at every turn. The man who doesn't register and who doesn't vote is the real political criminal, and not the bosses or machines whom he commissions by his negligence to do as they please.

"This lecture is intended for you, Sir, who read this article, if you are still unregistered; and if you are registered, we hope you will pass it along to the man who isn't, that he may see himself as others see him.

"Sooner or later, if political lagards do not mend their ways, we may have a compulsory registration and voting law, or a system of forfeitures by which the vote of the negligent male may be transferred to his wife or some feminine member of his family. That would be a punishment that would fit the crime; and if this penalty were in force today, there would be such a rush to the registration offices as has never been witnessed before."


