Scire Facias to Enforce

X Mechanics' Lien.

The State of Maryland, to the Sheriff of St. Mary's County, Greeting:

Whereas heretofore, to wit, on the 23rd day of February, in the year Nineteen hundred and sixteen, a certain Harrison Essell, of St. Mary's County, died a citizen in the Circuit Court for St. Mary's County for the sum of One hundred and seventy-two dollars and one cent (\$172.01), the same being for a Mechanics' Lien against the Sloop "William Austin," Zeb, S. Mears and James W. Corbin, owners.

And whereas it is alleged that the said sum still remains due and unpaid to the said Harrison Essell, now we command you that you make known to the said Zeb, S. Mears and James W. Corbin, all such persons as may claim ownership of said Sloop, that they let and appear before the Circuit Court of St. Mary's County, to be held at the Court House in Leonardtown on the Third Monday of March next, to show, if any thing they know or have to say, why the said sum of One hundred and seventy-two dollars and one cent should not be levied of the said Sloop "William Austin," according to the form and effect of the Act of Assembly in such case made and provided, if to them it shall seem expedient, and have you then and there this writ.
