Croix De Guerre

Pvt. William Theodore Hayden, son of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Hayden, of Hermandville, has been decorated with the French medal, the "Croix de Guerre," for bravery displayed under fire. He was among the first of the young men of this county to volunteer when America entered the war, and he will be heartily congratulated upon the courage which has won him this rare distinction. Below is a copy of the order referring to his exploit:

Order No. 11,549 (Extract)

G. H. 2. Of the Armies of the North and North-east.

Private William T. Hayden, 51st Company, 5th Regiment of Marine, "has proven his great courage when, wounded by shrapnel, he bravely dragged his wounded comrades through a terrible artillery fire."

At Grand Headquarters the 15th November, 1918.

The Commander-in-Chief, To witness the effect: PETAIN.

Lieutenant-Colonel, Chief of the "Personal Office."
