The Board of Directors of the Maryland Tobacco Growers' Association met at La Plata on July 3rd, and heard a report from the director of organization, Mr. Stephenson, who is gathering important data on the market situation. Definite plans for the organization are rapidly being formed and much serious thought is being given to the matter. Of course it will be necessary for the farmers to put up some kind of a forfeit to guarantee their support, and the nature of it will be determined at the next meeting on July 11. Mr. Stephenson had a conference with the French Ambassador on Saturday last, and no doubt he will be in a position to give some real facts about the situation as regards the French market.

Raddiffe Chautauqua Program

Final preparations are under way for the opening of the Chautauqua in Leonardtown on Wednesday next, July 16, and continuing on the 17th and 18th. Performances will start at 3:45 in the afternoon and at 8:45 in the evening.

For the first day (Wednesday) the David Dugan Company will strike a rousing chord. David Dugan, the Scotch tenor and entertainer, and his fellow-players, make a group of unmistakable artistic worth. Dr. Robert Weber Moore, of Colgate University, a gifted thinker and educator and an orator of the first order, will be the lecturer on this day. Subject in afternoon, "The Lamp of Aladdin," and in the evening, "The Greatest Thing that Men May Know."

On Thursday we will have the Schubert Concert Co., a group of novelty players, shifting their repertory from the popular to the classic in a pleasing musical program. In the afternoon Miss Daphne Carraway, of North Carolina, specialist in Home Economics, will lecture on "Home Making." In the evening the Chautauqua Director, Dr. Martin C. Hoffman, of Huntington College, Indiana, will be the lecturer, and his subject, "The Problem of the Unprepared."

On Friday, the Bart Witz Company a concert organization of solo artists, under the leadership of Bart Witz, head of the cello department of Peabody Institute of Baltimore, will render a program of unusual distinction. In the afternoon Miss Mary Jenkins, a Red Cross nurse fresh from service in France, will draw from her fund of actual experiences, and after the performance will hold a conference with the ladies, at which she will discuss the "Home Care of the Sick." At night the Chautauqua Director will lecture again, his subject being "Pushing Back the Horizon."

The entire program is arranged so as to both interest and entertain, the musical numbers (and we are promised this year the best music we have ever had) are so arranged and selected as to please every ear.

At the close of the performance on Friday night an informal dance will be held at Hotel St. Mary's from 10:30 to 1.

The Chautauqua will be held, as heretofore, in the cool, well-ventilated and comfortably seated Court House, on a stage especially erected for the purpose.

All proceeds over and above actual expenses will be devoted to the fund for the Home-Coming Celebration for the men who "won the war." The amount realized for this worthy purpose will depend entirely on the number of tickets sold.

"Meats in Storage"

Every working day of the year 75,000,000 pounds of meat are required to supply home and export needs—and only 10 per cent of this is exported.

These facts must be kept in mind when considering the U. S. Bureau of Markets report that on June 1, 1919, there were 1,348,000,000 pounds of meats in cold storage. If the meat in storage was placed on the market it would only be 20 days' supply.

This meat is not artificially withheld from trade channels to maintain or advance prices.

Meats in storage consist of—

- 65 per cent (approximate) hams, bacon, etc., in process of curing. It takes 30 to 90 days in pickle or salt to complete the process.
- 16 per cent in frozen pork that is to be cured next in the year.
- 8 per cent in lard. This is only four-fifths of a pound per capita, and much of it will have to go to supply European needs.
- 19 per cent in frozen beef and lamb, part of which is owned by the Government and was intended chiefly for over-seas shipment. If this were all diverted to domestic trade channels, it would be only 1 1/2 lbs. per capita—3 days' supply.

From this it will be seen that "meats in storage" represent merely unfinished goods in process of curing and the working supply necessary to assure the consumer a steady flow of finished product.
