TRADE ACCEPTANCES.

An interesting experiment is being tried by a hosiery company in urging its buyers to make use of trade acceptances. It is explained to these buyers that they may in this way save one-half of 1 per cent on their purchases.

PROCLAMATION

DECLARING SOLDIERS' VOTE LAW NO LONGER OPERATIVE. WHEREAS, by proclamation issued the 15th day of January, 1919, I suspended the operation of the election laws of the State, and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder, and to the extent authorized by Chapter 75 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1918, to the end that the provisions of said Act authorizing and providing the means for duly qualified voters absent in the military or naval service of the United States to vote by mail at general, primary or special elections, might be and become effective, as therein set forth.

AND WHEREAS, said Act was passed and my Proclamation thereunder issued as a war measure, with the object of giving the soldiers and sailors of Maryland, who enlisted especially for the war with Germany, the opportunity of voting during their absence in service during said war.

AND WHEREAS, the said war is practically over and peace is about to be declared, and the soldiers and sailors of Maryland, for whose benefit as aforesaid the said Act was passed and my Proclamation issued, have practically returned to Maryland and been demobilized, so that the condition for which the Act was passed and aforesaid proclamation issued is now or is about to be over.

AND WHEREAS, section 228 of the said Act provides that whenever the condition which resulted in the issuing of said Proclamation terminates, it shall be the duty of the Governor, as soon as convenient and proper, by proclamation, to end the suspension of said election laws, and the provisions of said Act for absent voting shall become inoperative.

AND WHEREAS, in view of the aforesaid facts and circumstances, and proper that the proclamation contemplated by said section 228 should be issued.

Now, therefore, I, Emerson C. Harrington, Governor of Maryland, by virtue of the authority conferred upon me as aforesaid by said Act of Assembly, do hereby proclaim and declare the aforesaid suspension of the election laws terminated and as an end, so that the provisions of said Act of 1918, Chapter 75, may be and become inoperative, to the same extent as if my Proclamation of January 15, 1919, with reference to voting by absent soldiers and sailors, had never been issued.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and caused to be affixed the Great Seal of the State of Maryland, in the City of Annapolis, on this 23rd day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred and nineteen.

EDUCATION IN SCHOOL.

A teacher of long experience recently remarked that the most ignorant children she had to deal with came from the two social extremes—from homes in which the mothers had to be away from home working, and from those in which the mothers were so busy with society that they had little time for their children. The point of this remark is that an essential part of the ordinary child's education must be done in the home, says Kansas City Star. With this part missing, the school is under a severe, often fatal, handicap. Many families act on the assumption, although they may not express it, that the school alone is responsible for the children's education. They assume no responsibility in the home. They make no effort to see that the children have a chance to become interested in good books. They do not regard the educational possibilities of intelligent conversation at the dinner table.
