ALEXANDER CLAUDHAYO N CARDINAL PASSES AWAY

James Cardinal Gibbons, Archbishop of Baltimore and primate of the American Catholic Hierarchy, died at his residence in Baltimore at 11:32 a. m. on Thursday, March 29th, in the 87th year of his age. The aged prelate suffered a relapse on Sunday after partially recovering from an attack sustained last November while administering the sacrament of confirmation and was unconscious for twenty-four hours preceding his death.

HIS LIFE JOURNEY.

Born in Baltimore July 23, 1834, on the west side of Gay street, a short distance north of Fayette, in a house which was torn down in 1892 to make way for the widening of Lexington street. His father and mother were Irish immigrants, Thomas Gibbons and Bridget (Walsh) Gibbons.

Taken to Ireland in 1837 by his parents, on their return to their native country because of the father's falling health.

Remained in Ireland where he received a liberal education, until 1853, when, in consequence of his father's death in 1847, his mother determined to come back to the United States, and after an unusually perilous voyage, reached New Orleans, where they decided to settle.

Became a clerk in a grocery store kept by William C. Raymond and showed great aptitude for business.

Attended mission services at St. Joseph's Church, New Orleans, in the spring of 1854 and felt an imperative call to the priesthood, and in spite of fine business prospects and the reluctance of his mother he resolved to dedicate himself to the church.

Came to Baltimore in the summer of 1855, when he was 21 years old, and entered St. Charles College, Elliot City, Md., and two years later, in 1857, began his studies in St. Mary's Seminary, Baltimore.

September 15, 1858, received the tonsure at the hands of Archbishop Kenwick, who conferred upon him the four minor orders June 16, 1859. The same prelate promoted him to the subdiaconate June 28, 1861, to the diaconate June 29 and to the priesthood June 30.

Assigned to St. Patrick's Parish, Falls point, July, 1861, under the Rev. James Dolan, and in 1862 was in charge by the latter of a little church called St. Bridget's, Canton, of which he was made full pastor toward the end of 1861.

In October, 1865, transferred to the Cathedral as Secretary to Archbishop Spalding.

J. FRANK SMITH

J. Frank Smith, for fifty years a commanding figure in the political life of St. Mary's County, died at his home at Scotland on Sunday afternoon, March 27, aged 78 years.

Mr. Smith has held many public positions, the last being that of Sheriff, to which he was elected in 1877. He also served in the Internal Revenue Office in Baltimore under the first Cleveland administration; was collector for the Clerk of the Court of Appeals during the term of the late J. Frank Ford, and was chief tobacco inspector during the administration of Gov. John W. Casper. He afterwards served as a member of the State Roads Commission.

In 1906 he was the Democratic candidate for the State Senate, but was defeated.

He was born October 18, 1842, on Smithwood Farm, on the Potomac River, and was a life-long resident of this county.

Mr. Smith was connected with the most prominent families of Southern Maryland, being closely related to the Youngs and Hillis, of Prince George's county. To know him intimately and well was to esteem and admire him for his many noble traits of heart and mind. A truer, kinder and better man never lived. It is no wonder that he was so popular with his fellow men.

We venture to say that no man in political life was closer to the whole people of the State than Mr. Smith, and his wise counsel and advice was always sought by the notable men of the State.

In every life there are memories dear and sweet, and in the life of Mr. Smith these cluster around him so many kind thoughts and unselfish deeds that the words of the poet seem to us to apply especially to him:

"He helped the world upon its way,
His ways were straight, his soul was clean,
His faithings not unkind nor mean,
He loved his fellow-men and tried to help them."

In the death of such a man his idolized family should be consoled by the whispered teaching of faith, "Whom I love, I call."

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Alice Dunbar Smith; one son, Oden B. Smith, and three daughters, Mrs. J. Harry Raley, Mrs. Harry Beale and Mrs. P. H. Lloyd, all of Scotland, Va.

Funeral services with Requiem Mass, were held at St. Michael's Church, Ridge, on Tuesday, March 29, at 10 o'clock. Rev. M. J. Smith, S. J., officiated, assisted by Rev. J. Brent Matthews, Rev. John La Farge and Rev. A. J. Emerick.

Honorary pallbearers were Judge R. H. Camaller, Hon. George C. Levey, Dr. C. V. Hayden, Messrs. Lawrence P. Williams, Samuel Hayden, Wm. W. Clark and Edward Stone. The active pallbearers were Messrs. Geo. W. Joy, G. C. Roach, John H. Abell, Fred C. Davis, J. Harry Raley and Harry Beal.
